Better Buildings Appeal

Many thanks to all those parents, governors and other supporters of the School who have donated to our appeal this year. We expect to have raised a fantastic total of £93,000 by the summer. It is not too late to donate to the appeal and details of how you can do this are given below.

Plans are well underway for the refurbishment of some areas over the summer holidays. We are creating two new classrooms and a much needed multi-functional space which will be used for lectures, assemblies and other School events. In addition, we now have a dedicated STEM activity room to support a number of clubs and competitions from September onwards. We were disappointed that our bid to the Condition Improvement Fund was unsuccessful. At the time of writing, we are preparing a bid to the Selective Schools Expansion Fund and expect to hear the outcome before Christmas. The School's phased campus development master plan identifies the following priorities:-

- ♦ Sports Hall
- ◆ New teaching block to replace Bancroft
- ♦ Refurbishment of Science Labs
- Refurbishment of existing Gym into a new Learning Resource Centre including enhanced Sixth Form study facilities
- Refurbishment of existing Library to provide an additional Art room and general teaching space.


Our fundraising target is £100,000 by July 2018 and we need your support

Curriculum

"Dare to understand!"

In his essay, 'What is enlightenment?' (1784), the German philosopher Immanuel Kant summed up the era's motto in the following terms:

"Dare to understand! Have courage to use your own reason!"

With so many column inches, so much air play and television time given to the urgent matters of school finances, teacher recruitment and curriculum reform, it is forgivable to assume that the story of state education is one defined by the contours of chaos, chaos, chaos. It is when we find ourselves as scripted characters in this sorry tale that we must, as teachers, remind ourselves to not let the urgent crowd out the important. One of our fundamental professional duties as teachers, and indeed personal responsibilities as human beings, is to keep learning - to refresh our thinking and challenge ourselves to know more, as well as to understand clearly.

In the service of this, I would like to provide a reflection on a book which I think speaks to the values that are important to us at CCHS. In an important work, the noted public intellectual, Steven Pinker, provides an elegant and compelling case for bold enquiry and shared optimism: 'Enlightenment Now - the case for reason, science, humanism and progress'. He begins his case by referring to Immanuel Kant's seminal essay, 'What is enlightenment?' (1784), in which Kant declared that enlightenment's motto is, "Dare to understand!" As a teacher, I know that there are occasions when one has to resist the temptation to rephrase or reframe and, instead, simply let the majesty of the original speak freely - so, as Pinker notes,

"The Enlightenment principle that we can apply reason and sympathy to enhance human flourishing may seem obvious, trite, old-fashioned. I wrote this book because I have come to realise that it is not. More than ever, the ideals of reason, science, humanism, and progress need a wholehearted defence. We take its gifts for granted: newborns who will live more than eight decades, markets overflowing with food, clean water that appears at a flick of a finger and waste that disappears at the flick of another, pills that erase a painful infection, sons who are not sent

off to war, daughters who can walk the streets in safety, critics of the powerful who are not jailed or shot, the world's knowledge and culture available in a shirt pocket. [These] are human accomplishments, not cosmic birthrights. In the memories of many readers of this book - and in the experience of those in less fortunate parts of the world - war, scarcity, disease, ignorance and lethal menace are a natural part of existence. We know that countries can slide back into these primitive conditions, and so we ignore the achievements of the Enlightenment at our peril." (p.4)

Pinker then takes us on a journey of optimistic, yet grounded, exploration and revelation, analysing many facets of material existence, cultural significance and intellectual urgency. He pursues a reasoned and evidence-based methodology, in accordance with the Enlightenment principles he so cherishes, to present a picture of our world which may seem almost alien, given the modern obsession to focus on the rain shower rather than the rainbow that follows.

"For all the bleeding headlines, for all the crises, collapses, scandals, plagues, epidemics, and existential threats, [there] are accomplishments to savour. The Enlightenment is working: for two and half centuries, people have used knowledge to enhance human flourishing. Scientists have exposed the workings of matter, life and mind. Inventors have harnessed the laws of nature to defy entropy, and entrepreneurs have made their innovations affordable. Lawmakers have made people better off by discouraging acts that are individually beneficial but collectively harmful. Diplomats have done the same with nations. Scholars have perpetuated the treasury of knowledge and augmented the power of reason. Artists have expanded the circle of sympathy. Activists have pressured the powerful to overturn repressive measures, and their fellow citizens to change repressive norms. All these efforts have been channelled into institutions that have allowed us to circumvent the flaws of human nature and empower our better angels." (p.324 -25)

Year 11 enjoyed some yoga sessions as the revision became more intense towards GCSEs, allowing time to be calm and practise their breathing and exercises.

CCHS PSHE and Well-being Programme A Life Well Lived

Our PSHE and well-being programme aims to fulfil all of the statutory requirements of delivering PSHE and more. We take guidance from the PSHE Association, many professional organisations and external agencies. We are passionate about developing strong and independent women, who can confidently take their place in the world. We allow a safe space to discuss all of the issues covered on the programme and encourage our girls to develop confidence with their own intellectual and social abilities, including public speaking and developing grit and resilience. Emotional intelligence and discernment is a strong theme that runs through the programme to support the girls as they develop a deeper understanding of themselves and the world that they live in. Our programme is also aligned with the school aims and vision. Our aim of developing the Leaders of Tomorrow is borne out, as we actively prepare the girls to developing their leadership characteristics, so that they can go on to lead in whichever field that they choose.

The three broad themes are: Health and Wellbeing, Relationship and Sex Education.

Living In the Wider World - economic wellbeing, careers and the world of work. This year we have welcomed visitors from many walks of life to give talks to the girls as part of their PSHE programme. Some of the visitors have included: self-defence training, The Teenage Cancer Trust, Road Safety Drama, the Fire Service, Understanding Animal Research, Samaritans, Local Government Officer, Reality Roadshow drug and alcohol abuse awareness, Domestic Abuse

presentation, and a visit from a local magistrate to name but a few.

Some of our Year 10 girls found a visit to Mabel the dog a soothing distraction as they approached their Year 10 examinations.

We also use the CEOP training materials to guide the girls when making choices in their social media use. We try to instil a sense of responsibility and self-discipline so that the girls can make wise choices and not fall into some of the traps. Year 10 viewed the film Like Me and discussed the choices that some of the characters made and how things could have turned out differently. Parents may find this film helpful.

We have published a CCHS Curriculum Enrichment Booklet 2017-18 to provide a detailed account of the activities and trips relating to our Enrichment Days (this is available in the Extra-Curricular section of the School website). It also provides information on enrichment opportunities which sit outside these formal days. The booklet provides a rationale and context for the wealth of activities and opportunities on offer to students.

Thursday 14th June 2018

Our fourth Enrichment Day, Thursday 14th June, saw Year 7 students travelling to Normandy, led by Mrs Adams, to learn about the culture and history of this significant region. Dr Pratt arranged for Year 8 students to visit an ecology site to undertake field-work – they also made and drank nettle tea! Following a morning of workshops with Mrs Foley, Mr Carter and Mr Lamberti, Year 9 students visited the theatre to watch 'The Woman in Black'. Year 10 spent a day working with visitors and CCHS staff exploring the wonders of the Elizabethan

Age. The many facets of lives lived during a different era were explored, including politics, entertainment and food. Sixth Form students supported our primary project with Mrs Cross. The project involved Years 4-5 girls from local primary schools, working on a day of maths challenges. As ever, it was a delight to welcome primary pupils and their staff to our School.

Wednesday 11th July 2018

Our fifth Enrichment Day, Wednesday 11th July, Mrs Nicoll provided an opportunity for Year 7 student to work on a series of experiments to broaden their understanding of applying scientific knowledge to practical problems. Year 8 students attended the theatre to enjoy 'Matlida'. Mrs French worked with Year Leaders, form tutors and Year 12 students to provide a series of PSHE workshops for Year 9 students. Year 10 students spent an enterprising day working on their Dragons' Den projects. Mr Moore and Mrs Newton invited several business guests to work with our students. Mr Lamberti and Mrs Clements ran a day of music-making for Years 4-5 girls from local primary schools.

Teaching and support staff are to be thanked for their excellent and innovative work.

Athletics Report 2018

The athletics season got off to a fine start, with record numbers turning up to training. Training started in the cold months of October and November, making the most of the brilliant facilities at Melbourne track. This was the first time Year 7 had a taste of the various different athletics events on offer, and to find what they most enjoyed.

We competed in many friendly competitions this year, against Great Baddow School and New Hall School, taking large teams across all year groups. However, the two main competitions this year for the Track and Field cup and the CESSSA Championships.

In June, at the Melbourne track, a large squad of CCHS girls took on the rest of the district, sporting their CCHS vests in style. Sadly, due to year 8 being in the Rhineland they were unable to compete, so we were down on points, however, there were some outstanding individual performances. In the year 7 competition there were stellar performances from Adi Grant, finishing 4th in the 200m and from Molly Ramage in 6th place in the hurdles. Having qualified for the National Athletics final last year, the Junior and Inter girl's teams approached this year's competition with a positive

As usual, the first round was at our very own Melbourne track, completing against schools such as Eastwood Academy, St Martins and Moulsham School, just to name a few. For year 7 this was their first taste of competing at such a high calibre competition, and having to compete in both a track and a field event, made selecting the team very difficult for Miss Bellamy and Miss Sales. The girls outdid expectations; the Junior team finished in 4th place with 284 points, and the Inter team scored 303 points and finished in 3rd place and qualifying them for the Regional 'B' final in Watford.
