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Since the adoption of the National Curriculum in 1988, many leaders and policy makers assumed that, because the government had stipulated what schools were required to teach, no further discussion about the curriculum was needed.

This assumption was a mistake for two reasons. Firstly, it set out the legal framework in terms of the minimum requirement that schools were legally required to teach; schools were always entirely free to teach whatever they wished in addition to the prescribed national curriculum. Secondly, no reference was made to the 'real curriculum', by which I mean the lived daily experience of young people in classrooms, purely dependent on the creative input of teachers.

Following a shake-up of the education system, schools with academy status were advised that they were no longer required to follow the National Curriculum but that they must teach a broad and balanced curriculum, to include the subjects of English, Maths, Science, and Religious Education.



The School Inspection Framework published in 2019, reiterated this advice, but extended it to include the period during which it must be taught: 'schools must have made provision to ensure that pupils still have the opportunity to study a broad range of subjects, commensurate with the national curriculum, in Years 7 to 9'. And in an interview in July 2019, Ofsted Inspector Heather Fearn wrote, 'during inspection, inspectors will talk to senior leaders to find out whether the curriculum is broad and balanced. Is it at least as ambitious as the national curriculum?'

It appears to me that 33 years since its adoption into the education system, and 7 years since its relaxation, the National Curriculum still dominates as the supposedly 'gold standard' of education.

I am certainly not opposed to the notion of a framework of subjects that students are encouraged to study, and very much in favour of a broad and balanced curriculum, but I am opposed to the notion that curriculum begins and ends with subjects, courses, and programs of study, and very much in favour of driving forward the notion that curriculum is so very much more nuanced.

It involves the knowledge and skills students are expected to learn, which includes the learning objectives they are expected to meet; the units and lessons that teachers teach; the assignments and projects given to students; the books, materials, videos, presentations, and readings used in a course; and the tests, assessments, and other methods used to evaluate student learning. In this sense, every school's curriculum will therefore, by definition, be unique, by establishing, meeting and adapting to the individual needs of their students.



### **Curriculum News** Mrs Emma Ledwidge, Deputy Headteacher

Teachers develop their own curricula, often refining and improving them over years. Curriculum development is an inherently creative process in which teachers take the desired outcomes from the intended curriculum and convert them into engaging activities in classrooms, thinking about, studying, discussing, and analysing curriculum, until they have acquired a specialist's expertise in curriculum development - i.e., they know how to structure, organize, and deliver lessons in ways that facilitate or accelerate student learning.

To non-educators, some curriculum materials may seem simple or straightforward (such as a list of required reading, for example), but they may reflect a deep and sophisticated understanding of an academic discipline and of the most effective strategies for learning acquisition.

The curriculum is the result of many choices that have been made during the curriculum development process and interestingly, what is left out speaks just as loudly as what is included, what Eliot Eisner calls the 'null curriculum', 'the options students are not afforded; the perspectives they may never know about, much less be able to use; the concepts and skills that are not part of the intellectual repertoire' (Eisner, 1985, The educational imagination).

What I think is apparent is that there can never be a paint by numbers approach to curriculum development. A school's curriculum has to be relevant to the students for whom it is intended, and it is teachers that connect the valued outcomes to the students in front of them. This is where teacher creativity is most important.

During my research for this article, I was interested to learn that the word "curriculum" is a Latin term for a track around which competitors race. If that is the case and we take the literal meaning in the Latin sense, then the race that we are running, perhaps to obtain the perfect curriculum or gold standard, will be a long one.



Curriculum development is not something done periodically, but part of every school's regular cycle of improvement and renewal, and so perhaps if we are running a race, it is an infinite relay.

Either way, a framework is one thing, but the reality of curriculum development is much less linear and much more organic, much more locally, or indeed, individually devised, which means there can be nothing national about it.





As a school we are continually looking for ways in which we can enhance our students' learning journey and to equip them with the skills needed for academic enjoyment and success both now and in the future.

Following the successful launch of the CCHS Academic Excellence in Research Award for our Year 10 students, Mrs Cross and Mrs Ellen have continued to work in conjunction with NACE (The National Association for Able Children in Education) and with Cambridge University's Education Research Faculty to identify specific study skills and personal attributes beneficial for students at different stages of their secondary education. This has enabled us to put together a programme of academic enrichment starting in Year 7 and continuing until Year 13. The overarching aim of this programme is to give all students the opportunity to develop, practice and build key academic skills and personal attributes as they progress through the school which will be of benefit to them in their school careers and also in their future ambitions.

Our Year 7 and 9 students were the first year groups to take part in this programme. On the 21<sup>st</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> June they participated in a morning of activities designed to build academic resilience and to develop important study skills. For both mornings we were joined by <u>Elevate Education</u>, who specialise in delivering research based, high impact workshops on study skills, motivation, wellbeing, and exam preparation. This was followed by two additional workshops lead by CCHS staff building on the skills and activities from the Elevate session.





**Teaching & Learning** 



Both days were an incredible success with 98% of Year 7 and 9 students suggesting they would recommend the sessions and 99% stated that the mornings were time well spent. When asked about her experience one Year 7 student told us that the "sessions we participated in on Monday were very beneficial to me and taught me a lot. I learnt about how to make studying more efficient and I am now able to recall and successfully apply all the tips and tricks I was shown into my revision and daily work".

As a school we are excited for the future development of this project in the next academic year with further events and opportunities for students planned, starting with Year 12 in September. We are grateful to all the staff involved who gave their time to support these incredibly successful launch events and look forward to sharing updates on Academic enrichment at CCHS over the next year.


#### Year 7 Mrs Nina Lewis, Year Leader

# **School News**

#### German

We have had a busy year in the German Department where lots of students have taken advantage of the extracurricular activities on offer, even in a global pandemic.

We were thrilled to be awarded the Jack Petchy funds from Gracie G (Y8) after all her hard work in lockdown which has purchased a year's Linguascope subscription which has benefitted all MFL students from all year groups so we are very grateful.

There were a number of translation competitions offered to all year groups with success for Eesha (Y10), Mariella (Y11) and Manaal (Y11).



We have started a pen pal scheme for Y10 students with the Taus Gymnasium, our Exchange school. In Year 12, students took part in an online debate organised by the Goethe Institute. Hannah (Y13) was also successful in two competitions including the German Olympiad and one of her prizes was to take part in a virtual event with other young people learning German, again organised by the Goethe Institute.

#### CCHS Academic Excellence in Research Award



In September 2020 the Year 10 cohort embarked upon the CCHS Academic Excellence In Research Award, a programme based on the Higher Project Qualification (HPQ).

The HPQ requires students to carry out research on a religious, philosophical or ethical topic that they have chosen and is not covered by their other qualifications. They then use this research to produce a written report and presentation.

This was the first time we ran this initiative and it provided Year 10 students with the perfect way to extend and develop beyond the material studied in class and offers students an opportunity to explore their passion for a subject.

Upon completion of the projects there are nine Year 10 students who have been awarded with the Platinum Prize for their exceptional reports and presentations.

### English

It has been a fantastic year for Year 10 who have had some incredible successes in the world of competitive public speaking and debating. In January, Manya and April won the first round of the English Speaking Union (ESU) Mace Debate despite being a team member short. They were joined in March by Rhythm at the regional final where they performed amazingly over the course of a gruelling and hard-fought four-hour competition, although their competition ended there. At the start of the academic year all Year 10 students took part in the annual Jack Petchey Speak Out Challenge workshops, run by a fabulous team of external coaches who help students to develop their confidence in public speaking. #### **GCSE and A-Level Performances**

As has been the case with Drama departments up and down this country, we have had to make massive adaptions to our curriculum this year. A particular adaption has been to GCSE and A-Level practical performances. In usual years, we rehearse our scripted performances in small groups and perform these to an audience of parents, friends and other school staff. However, this year our students were challenged with preparing a monologue for performance to both Mr Selby and Mrs Broughton.

Beginning our preparations over lockdown using Microsoft Teams our GCSE students were given a monologue to prepare over a five-week period. Collaborating with peers (both online and eventually in person) we were treated some outstanding performances from our GCSE students. These performances came from plays such as: Daisy Pulls it Off by Denise Deegan, Girls Like That by Evan Placey, Things I Know to be True by Andrew Bovell and DNA by Dennis Kelly (to name just a few...). We were astonished by the quality of these monologue performances, with students overcoming the nerves of performing by themselves to deliver outstanding pieces of Drama.

Our A-Level students received a similar experience to those at GCSE, starting their scripted performances during lockdown via Microsoft Teams. All students performed their chosen monologue using the style of Naturalism influenced by Konstantin Stanislavski. His belief was that actors should present 'truth on stage' and our students did a tremendous job of creating this effect in their performances. 




