We have been able to re-establish enrichment activities and trips for a number of year groups. Lunchtime clubs and societies flourished this year, allowing students from different year groups to meet and work together on common interests. Indeed, this is a key strength of our House system as well. A great variety of House events took place across the year, bringing with them healthy competition and lots of fun.

We, like all schools across the country, were able to return to GCSE and A level public examinations for Year 11 and Year 13 students. We are so very proud of all the students – they worked hard, supported each other and showed such positivity and maturity; such brilliant role models.

It is my great privilege to lead our amazing school and I would like to thank all members of the CCHS community for their work, commitment, engagement and support across the year. I would like to pay a particular tribute to school staff (support staff colleagues and teachers), who have worked incredibly hard, in terms of lessons, pastoral support, student and school services, enrichment and extra-curricular provision. Allied with our talented and ambitious students, and the great support and encouragement of their parents, our governors and the CCHS Alumnae, we have been able to achieve so much together this year. This lived experience of community will continue to serve us well as we work together to progress our commitment to girls' education and empowerment.

I hope CCHS families have a lovely summer break. We look forward to welcoming students and colleagues back in September to start the 2022-23 academic year, which will be filled with more opportunities, activities and projects to inspire our amazing students.

Curriculum News Mrs Matthews, Deputy Headteacher



Walk into any truly excellent school and you can feel it almost immediately - a calm, orderly atmosphere that hums with an exciting, vibrant sense of purposefulness just under the surface. Students carry themselves with determination and confidence. Teachers talk about their work with excitement and conviction. Everyone seems to have a sense of place and purpose.

The importance of a positive school culture to educational outcomes is well-known, yet difficult to define, perhaps because is it intangible and not obviously detectable. Even the synonyms we use to describe a school's culture such as 'atmosphere' and 'climate' make it seem more like an atmospheric condition existing beyond human control.



Just as within society itself culture exists within the sociological norms and structures so too a school's culture must exist within a set of normative values, rules, and structured curriculum. I have led on curriculum for several years, and written articles about the importance of our taught curriculum's coherent structure. For 25 hours a week we teach our students the value of knowledge, for it is this knowledge that will provide the platform for their further education and career progression. I am genuinely passionate about curriculum as core, sitting at the heart of our educational system, but there's a 'but' coming. When I think back over my own education, rarely do my recollections relate to memories of subject matter, although I do recall scratching around in my long-term memory trying to decide whether it was Pythagoras's theorem or trigonometry that I needed to apply to a DIY project not too long ago! Generally speaking though I don't think about such concepts when I recall my time in education. Despite the fact that I diligently sat for 25 hours of the school week in lessons that made up the formal taught curriculum, it was the culture, the unsaid, the hidden aspect of curriculum that had the longest lasting impact.

As Marcel Proust said, in the context of writing:

'But when all is said, it is only the inexpressible, the thing one believes one cannot succeed in getting into a book, that remains in it. It is something vague and haunting, like a memory. It is atmospheric, a colouring in the air like the bloom on a grape...But it is not in the words, it is not said, it is all among the words, like the morning mist at Chantilly.'

Hidden curriculum is defined as a set of unwritten, unofficial, and unintended lessons, values, and perspectives that students learn in school along with more formal aspects of education. One of the best ways I have heard this described, is in an article by leadership and change experts Terrence Deal and Kent Peterson, who define school culture as an "underground flow of feelings and folkways [wending] its way within a school".

When I recall my time at CCHS, I will, of course, remember fondly the students and the staff, but I will also remember fondly the intangible aspect, that tertium quid that doesn't sit within the curriculum but is that Proustian unsaid, atmospheric, ethereal, that colours the very fabric of the school. When students and staff join CCHS they cannot but embody the culture that exists here.

Students at CCHS learn about so much more than facts and information presented during scheduled learning times. There's a subtlety rather like *the morning mist at Chantilly* that you won't find on any of their timetables. And that's an incredibly powerful advantage for students who attend this school because recent figures suggest that the role played by subtle lessons arising from the invisible curriculum accounts for close to 90% of all young people's learning experiences in a student's holistic development, preparing young people to be self-reliant, with a healthy self-identity and high self-esteem.



Curriculum News Mrs Matthews, Deputy Headteacher

A school's culture stems from its vision and its established values. But whether the culture is strong or weak depends on the actions, symbols, ceremonies, and rituals that are closely aligned with that vision. In this regard, as in so many others, CCHS is strong. The alignment is tight, the culture is strong, and new students and staff members pick up on the vision and values of CCHS almost immediately.

As I bid farewell to the students and my colleagues here at CCHS, I will recall with fondness the many tangible, concrete memories that were made, but mostly, I will remember how being part of CCHS made me feel.



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In June we were invited to speak at the NCGS Global Forum in Boston and to share the significant progress we have made as a community through our change@CCHS project.

Our talk "Change@CCHS - Inclusivity is a celebration of human diversity" was attended by school leaders from across the globe who wanted to hear about our work. "An opportunity to hear and learn from our diversity journey. Change@CCHS started as a means of contributing to anti-racism work but evolved into inclusivity in all its forms, as we committed to ensuring equality of education and opportunity for all, irrespective of race, sexual orientation, disability, religion, or socio-economic background. Our objective has been to ensure all those connected to the school are proud of their identity and able to participate fully in school life as a valued member of our community. We celebrate inclusivity, not as single social categorisations, but as overlapping, interdependent systems of advantage and disadvantage."

The feedback we received on behalf of our community was outstanding and we have shared our resources and contact details with colleagues for future collaboration.

Our presentation was based on our whole school change@CCHS project and represented the commitment of everyone in our community. In particular we extend our appreciation to Miss Pocock and Mr Harvey (School Development Leaders), our Diversity Prefects, our colleagues in school, the Geography RS and History departments, students, parents and our governing body.

The conference also marked a key moment for the National Coalition of Girls' Schools as they move from the NCGS to the ICGS, **The International Coalition of Girls' Schools**, with schools coming together globally to champion girls' education. This exciting evolution builds upon the coalition's momentum and underscores a commitment to elevating women's leadership worldwide through educating and empowering our students to be ethical, globally minded changemakers.

Over the course of the three-day conference we were able to connect with schools internationally to share best practise, to discuss key topics around girls' education and to make connections which will support our important work going forward.

We were also fortunately to hear three exceptional keynote speakers Leymah Gbowee, Dr Paula Johnson and Shabana Basij-Rasikh, all leaders in their own field, committed to the empowerment of women and champions of the significant impact women can have on the world. Leymah Gbowee,

Nobel Peace Laureate

А Liberian peace activist, trained social worker and women's rights advocate, Leymah Gbowee currently serves as Executive Director of the Women, Peace and Security Program at Columbia University's Earth **Institute**, and is the founder and President current of the Gbowee Peace Foundation Africa. Additionally, she is the founding head of the Liberia Reconciliation Initiative, cofounder and former Executive Director of Women Peace and Security Network Africa, and a founding member and former Liberian Coordinator of Women Peacebuilding Network/ in West Africa Network for Peacebuilding.



Dr Paula Johnson President Wellesley College

As a physician-scientist, President Johnson has improved health outcomes for women around the globe by revealing and addressing gender biases in both clinical care and medical research. The founder of the Connors Center for Women's Health and Gender Biology at Brigham and Women's Hospital, she shifted paradigms by recognizing that disease presentation is often influenced by sex, a biological factor, intersecting with the social determinants of health, including race.



Shabana Basij-Rasikg

Co-founder and President School of Leadership,

Afghanistan

Shabana Basij-Rasikh is the co-founder and president of the School of Leadership, Afghanistan (SOLA). SOLA is Afghanistan's first and only girls' boarding school, enrolling nearly 100 students. In August, Shabana led the evacuation of her students and SOLA's faculty from Afghanistan to Rwanda, where all are now engaged in a study abroad program.

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Drama News Mr Selby

It has been a wonderful year in Drama, filled with so many opportunities for our students to enrich themselves back in the art form after two turbulent years. We welcomed back visits to the theatre, opportunities to take part in theatre workshops, clubs and societies, and quite possibly the thing we missed doing most, our School Production.

This term we were treated to two sets of scripted exam performances by Year 11 and Year 13, which contributed towards 20% and 30% of their final grade respectively.

From Year 11, we experienced performances from plays such as: Girls Like That by Evan Placey, The Last Resort by Chris Owen, Bouncers by John Godber and Kindertransport by Diane Samuels (to name just a few). The quality of the Drama produced by our Year 11 Drama students was outstanding. They were highly effective in using all the skills and techniques they have learnt over the last two years and executing them with flair and precision.

Our Year 13 students took a slightly different approach to their performance work by submitting monologue performances to our external examiner. Year 13 chose a variety of challenging texts and extracts which enabled them to showcase their talents in the most sophisticated of ways. These included performances from: What Shall We Tell Caroline? by John Mortimer, Invisible Friends by Alan Ayckbourn, Antigone by Sophocles and Romeo and Juliet by William Shakespeare (again, to name just a few). They approached these extracts with great determination and produced performances of great quality – work which they should be proud of.





Our Year 12 Drama Prefects have also been busy this half-term. In addition to leading our Year 8 Drama Society (in collaboration with King Edward IV Grammar School) they have also planned and delivered enrichment sessions to our Year 8 students, contributing to our Year 8 creative enrichment day. The day was focused on Musical Theatre, with students taking



part in singing, dancing and acting workshops, with our students focusing on the acting side. A brilliant day was had by all involved and thank you to our Year 12 prefects for all their hard work in contributing to the planning and delivery of these workshops.

Earlier in the year, the National Youth Theatre (NYT) offered young people aged 14-25 the opportunity to audition to be a part of their acting programme. Students were asked to submit a 'self-tape' where they filmed themselves performing a monologue and answering questions about the performing arts world. We are saying goodbye to our latest German assistant, Bengt Meyer, after a term supporting all our students with their speaking skills. He has also been able to enjoy some CCHS traditions and events including Sports' Day and House Cakes.

We have been thrilled to see students taking full advantage of German extra-curricular opportunities, including entries for the Anthea Bell Translation Prize resulting in a prize at regional level and a winning essay entry in the Oxford German Olympiad for Mariella (12VCA). We are still awaiting the results of entries to the Cambridge Language Collective's Essay competition and have a year 12 applying to be part of the UK German Connection Youth Council.

Two of our students successfully applied for virtual courses with UK German Connection being held over the summer so we look forward to hearing about their experiences in September. Finally, we were thrilled when Amelia (12FSE) was selected to attend a two day Linguastars residential course at Leeds University. Below is her account of the visit.



On the 28th and 29th of June I went to the Leeds University Linguastars Residential. It is a two day free university experience provided by the university, exploring possibilities through languages. I was part of the German course, but the options were Spanish, German and French.

We Also had the opportunity to take part in languages For beginners, and added our preferences in the paperwork. I was really pleased to get Portuguese (being a Spanish student) and Japanese, neither of which I had learnt before.

As well as this, I took part in several German workshops, learning about the debate of which gender neutral terms are most useable, and German colloquial and region dependent terms. On the first day, I was nervous but excited to take the train (even at 4am) to Leeds With Katherinegrace, who takes French. When we arrived, immediately the atmosphere was really welcoming (once we finally found where we were going!!) and even the students we asked went above and beyond to get us to the right building. We really weren't sure what to expect but found that there were about 14 German students, 20 Spanish and 20 French. My favourite part was learning aspects of languages which aren 't necessarily taught in School, and I felt completely at ease in all of the sessions, being with such passionate people! The Spanish students learnt about The Civil War, which we cover in A level so that was nice to hear about too.
