


Cool and unruly: how disordered materials could refrigerate the world

An IOP / CSES lecture for the public, presented by Dr Anthony Phillips, Queen Mary University of London

Which molecular shapes encourage disordered structures the best?



It is well known that the beautiful facets of crystals are a consequence of the regular geometric arrangement of the atoms and molecules from which they are formed. But real crystalline materials can deviate substantially from these mathematically perfect arrangements, accommodating surprising levels of structural disorder. This isn't just a curiosity, but leads directly to applications ranging from solid-state refrigeration to switchable dielectrics. I will present ways to measure this disorder, and show how and why we might want deliberately to introduce it.
