I use my remarks in our weekly bulletin to share a reflection on how education and schools are viewed and treated. "Education, education, education" an echo from 1996 - just to have it said loud and proud once by one of our many Education Secretaries in the last year and more would have been a welcome start. On Tuesday 25th October we learnt that Gillian Keegan is to be our new Secretary of State for Education. We were informed of this appointment after the 'great offices of state' had been announced, as is the way of it in our political culture. The expression, 'children should be seen and not heard' seems decidedly progressive compared to how young people are continually relegated in the national policy hierarchy. Gillian Keegan is the fifth Secretary of State for Education in four months, the sixth in fourteen months and the tenth since 2010

I am aghast at the unvarnished disregard and disrespect shown towards children, their families, school staff, and their families, through this political turmoil and ministerial anarchy. My question is this: when will education actually become the national priority that it clearly is and should always be? Politicians are quick to invoke "our children and our grandchildren" when they wish to convince us of their humanity and sincerity about any number of policy decisions. And yet the most genuine way our high politicians could achieve this is to put education and schools at the centre of national life and policy initiatives.

Children are deserving of the very best, now, and always. Education is always the answer. Schools should be palaces. And the position of Secretary of State for Education should be revered as the great office of state. I do hope that Gillian Keegan is given both the time to articulate a vision for education in our country and then the resources to deliver on it.

We can but hope. In the meantime, we will continue to work as a community to support, encourage and inspire the wonderful students who grace our school. On a local level, we are fortunate indeed to have an engaged, informed and attentive constituency MP: Vicky Ford.

Perhaps we look back to the wisdom of Edmund Burke, who noted the bonds within a local community are a vital source of civic strength: "To be attached to the subdivision, to love the little platoon we belong to in society, is the first principle (the germ as it were) of public affections." Beyond my own reflection, I read with interest an article by James Kirkup, Director of the Social Market Foundation, in The Sunday Times on 30th October, titled: 'There's a deafening silence on education from both parties.'

As a school community, we will remain resolutely committed to excellence in girls' education and empowerment, in the knowledge that we are the guardians of a significant educational, and wider social, inheritance from 1907.





And speaking of excellence – we were blessed with our student organised Black Excellence Fest on Thursday afternoon. Martha, in Year 12, planned, led and hosted this magnificent event.

Students arranged refreshments, read poetry, performed music and dance. Each performance was an inspiration in itself. As an overall cultural experience for us, students and staff, it was life-affirming.

What a privilege it was for us to witness such outstanding talent, intellect, passion and ambition. What a wonderful way to welcome the second part of the Autumn Term. And what a testament to young people and all that they provide within and beyond their school community.
