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Dear CCHS Community

"Education is the kindling of a flame..." Socrates.

Last year, Mr Bradford and a group of Sixth Form Art students graced the end exterior wall of our swimming pool with a magnificent mural of Malala Yousafzai and some of the wise words she shared at the UN in 2013:"One child, one teacher, one book and one pen can change the world."

The importance of education has been brought home to us all since March 2020. More recently, the children of Ukraine have tragically known the disruption of so much more than their schooling. And yet, even with the horrors of war, education always finds a way. The reported efforts of parents and teachers to keep lessons running in that country have been inspiring.

Following the wrath of earthquakes which have blighted Turkey and Syria, again, countless heroic people have prioritised the education of children, whether in a tent, amongst the rubble or under the sky.

For those of us who teach, there is technical language, the process and, inevitably, an examination of some sort at the end of the journey. For the parents of schoolchildren, there is the aspiration, support and the hope of fulfilment. And for those who sit at the heart of it all – the students themselves – there is the timetable, the lesson and the homework.

We hope there is so much more that is real, meaningful and lasting through the gift of education for our young people. The pursuit of an answer for no other reason than, "I must know!". The next page to be read in a novel. The experiment to be completed. The final brushstroke on a canvas. The crescendo of a piece of music. The race won on the track. The line delivered on the stage. An education journey is an incredibly personal one. We all have our stories to tell, the good friends, the favourite subjects, the exceptional teachers, the moment of revelation and the memory of achievement.

To return to Socrates, perhaps the ultimate irony of education is, as he put it, "I cannot teach anybody anything. I can only make them think." As a teacher, to secure an answer from a student is great. To receive a question from a student is wonderous.

The spark of wonder shared by small children, as they navigate the world unfolding before them, is encapsulated in the shortest, deceptively simple and yet most ambitious of all enquiries - "why?".

Our well-established school vision is to 'develop the leaders of tomorrow.' I think this speaks to a concept of citizenship, whereby we work to inspire students to think for themselves and act for others. To both encourage a liberation of thought and expect a responsibility of action is, I believe, the mark of a progressive and ambitious community. I think you will find much evidence of these qualities in the pages which follow, from staff and students.

I thank all members of the CCHS community for their contributions to the life of our school this term and wish our CCHS families well during the Easter holiday period.



Curriculum News Mrs Cross, Deputy Headteacher, Academic

The end of the Spring Term marks an exciting time for our students. Our Year 11 and Year 13 students are completing their courses and starting to embark on tailored revision programmes with their subject teachers and our Years 9 and 11 students are thinking hard about the next stage of their education.

In Year 9, students are making their first choices in choosing their option subjects and, in doing this, are starting to craft their own individual journey recognising their own strengths and the area they enjoy. Teaching and Learning

Metacognition and Self-Regulated Learning

A longstanding phrase commonly used in education circles is the term 'lifelong

learners'. As a school community, we have ambitions to create lifelong learners; to ensure that students leave with the educational skills that ensures they are well equipped for wider life. This exceeds the boundaries of just students being solely experts in their chosen GCSE or A-Level subjects, we are



committed to students having the learning habits to ascertain, retain and process new information, gained beyond their school years. Metacognition and selfregulation provide a scaffold to ensure students have the ability to learn effectively, in an independent context. While these attributes are important for wider learning, they are also highly impactful for self-directed study. I know many of out students will be spending time over the coming weeks preparing for formal examinations; below are detailed descriptions of processes that will aid this.

The characteristics of an independent learner can be broken into <u>three</u> essential components. These are needed to be known to help young people to develop with their independent learning practices:

- **Cognition** is the mental process involved in knowing, understanding, and learning. By cognitive strategies, we mean skills like memorisation techniques or subject-specific strategies like making different marks with a brush or using different methods to solve equations in maths. Cognitive strategies are fundamental to acquiring knowledge and completing learning tasks. Students must have these strategies so they can study and develop knowledge independently.
- **Metacognition** is about the ways learners monitor and purposefully direct their learning. For example, having decided that a particular cognitive strategy for memorisation is likely to be successful, a pupil should then monitor whether it has indeed been successful and then deliberately changes (or not) their memorisation method based on that evidence. By metacognitive strategies, we mean the strategies we use to monitor or control our cognition, such as checking that our memorisation technique was accurate or selecting the most appropriate cognitive strategy for the task we are undertaking.

Motivation is about our willingness to engage our metacognitive and cognitive skills and apply them to learning. Motivational strategies will include convincing oneself to undertake a tricky revision task now – affecting our current well-being – as a way of improving our future well-being in the test tomorrow.


To summarise, for effective and impactful independent learning to take place, students need to reflect and select appropriate strategies for their learning; continually review these strategies as they are working (to ensure they are successful for the task at hand); and ensure they remain resilient when trying to study, review and learn difficult concepts.

Reviewing one's own education practices, which is an important strategy to successfully action metacognition, can be difficult. It is important that students remain reflective of what works and what does not work. This is a process called selfregulation. Essentially, self-regulation is about the extent to which learners are aware of their strengths and weaknesses and the strategies they use to learn. They need to continually question and evaluate whether the strategies they are using are right for them; how well they are doing; and whether changes need to be made to improve the learning process; and most importantly recognising that learning from these changes is an important part of improving their independent learning practices.

Using this effective blend of metacognition and self-regulation can lead to massive results for students. Research undertook by the Education Endowment Foundation (2017) suggested that apply these principles not only create effective study habits for a prosperous future, but it can lead to a massive eight-month educational advantage for students. Learners are never too young to start actioning these practices into their independent routines, and as you can see, the benefits can be substantial. We, as a

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school, are ensuring that our learners are aware of the different strategies to be successful in their metacognitive and selfregulatory practices, not only now, but also for their wider educational life.

We remain committed to providing high quality enrichment activities for our students and continually seek opportunities to enhance our curriculum provision with inspiring, fun and enlightening events. This academic year we have fully embraced the return to whole school Enrichment Days and were excited that this term we were able to offer our second Enrichment Day of the academic year to our students with superb opportunities taking place across our campus.

Year 7 students had a superb day, visited by BAE Systems they spent an incredible day programming robots and understanding how technology can help recovery in disaster zones. It was a unique experience for our students who all had the opportunity to work with innovative technology and experienced individuals who specialise in this area. Year 8 students were gifted a day of English and Drama and were fortunate to have been able to watch a production of Macbeth performed by The Globe Players during the afternoon.

Year 9 students took part in a day of PSHE with visiting speakers and had the opportunity to work with our inspiring Year 12 students, and Year 10 students took part in our 2023 Eco Conference, where they were able to discuss environmental issues and develop skills relating to sustainable fashion and gardening.




Art News Mr Harvey, Subject Leader of Art & School Development Leader

They have explored a variety of performances in the renounced style of theatrical practitioner Konstantin Stanislavski. We were fortunate enough to experience some breath-taking naturalistic performances, from popular plays such as: A Streetcar Named Desire by Tennessee Williams, Hedda Gabler by Henrik Ibsen and Antigone by Sophocles. Again, we offer our upmost congratulations to our students for their theatrical triumphs.

However, the highlight of this term has to be out School Production 'Little Shop of Horrors', which took place in February. Little Shop of Horrors is a delectable sci-fi horror musical with an electrifying 1960s pop/rock score by Alan Menken and Howard Ashman. Our talented cast, band and crew were privileged to perform a three night 'sell out' run on the 1st, 2nd and 3rd of February. Although it seems hard to believe, this was my first musical at CCHS, and what an enjoyable experience it was.









This term has been a wonderfully busy one. From day one in January, we were straight into our final rehearsals for 'Little Shop of Horrors'. The hard work really paid off with the entire cast and crew putting on a stunning show. From a music

perspective we were blown away by the quality of the singing and the band. As I mentioned in the programme this was the full professional show which really showed the dedication and talent of our students. The feedback we have received from the audience was glowing which the students rightly deserved.



Throughout the term, rehearsals were busy taking place for the Spring Concert. This again was a triumph including all our extracurricular ensembles. We welcomed an additional ensemble this term called Sangeetham. This Indianian inspired ensemble was setup and led by one of our talented year 11 students who quite rightly saw an opportunity to develop our musical offerings further to inspire even more students to come and get involved. All our ensembles performed so beautifully in the concert with really energy. It is such a privilege to listen to the variety of talents our students have. We had approximately 250 students involved in the school and this number seems to creep up with every concert we put on. All this work links into our school being recognised as a Gold Artsmark school.

We again held out termly sitting for ABRSM graded music examinations. These went extremely well and at the time of writing we are still awaiting the results.

Within our regular music lessons KS3 students continue to perform, compose and analyse all kinds of different styles and genres. This term year groups focussed on Music in the media using music technology, 20th century minimalist music, Classical music, guitar skills and so much more. Our year 11 students completed their NEA work (60%) which consists of 2 performances and 2 compositions. Work is now ready to be internally moderated before being submitted to the exam board. Our A level students completed their final recitals in front of a visiting examiner. What a delight it was to listen to such exquisite performances with many pieces being well above the standard required of A level. Of course our students were nervous but they really stepped up and delivered. We will not know the official outcome until the examination results are released in the summer, but I am convinced this part of the course (35%) will be a real highlight.

Having studied the renowned play "La Casa De Bernarda Alba" by Federico García Lorca as part of the Spanish A-Level course, on the 9th of March, Years 12 and 13 students set out to Cervantes Theatre in Southwark, London to watch the piece come to life.

As we stepped into the theatre, we were greeted by dim lighting and a thrust stage (where the seating surrounded the stage on three sides) which embodied the oppressive atmosphere experienced by the characters within the play, similarly encircled by the watching eyes of the townspeople. The lights went down, and immediately, we were transported to an Andalusian household in the 1930s.

The story of desire and jealousy, freedom and oppression unfolded before us as the talented actresses brought to life the characters of Bernarda and her five freedom-starved daughters. Their performance voiced all the repressed emotions of these young women forced by tradition to spend eight years without leaving their house as mourning for their father, and it allowed us as an audience to visualise the dramatic scenes we had previously read in class.

Going to see the play live was extremely beneficial as it not only allowed us to revise the events that unfolded throughout the play, but also to cast a new light on our interpretations of the characters. We began to realise that Bernarda- who is often viewed as an iron-fisted and emotionless tyrant over her family- may have had some feelings of regret towards the end of the story. Additionally, it enriched our listening skills as we were able to follow the action and recognise certain phrases even though the actors were talking in very fast Spanish! We found it a refreshing and interactive way to learn about the play and would wholeheartedly recommend going to any future Spanish A-level students who have the chance to see it performed.

We (Matilda and Emily) took part in a British Parliamentary Debate Competition with Oxford Schools on Friday the 24th of February. We had great fun and are excited to share our experience with everyone, and hope that it will encourage others to take part too.

British Parliamentary Debating is a style of debate, in which 4 teams of 2 assume randomly assigned roles of Opening Government, Closing Government, Opening Opposition, and Closing Opposition. The debate topic is given to the debaters 15 minutes beforehand, and each person must speak for 5 minutes during their allotted time. You compete against the other 3 teams; however, you need to cleverly work with the points that the other team on your side of the debate provide before or after you speak. We had never done this before, but both of us were excited to audition for the competition when Mrs Watt advertised it to us!

Mrs Watt sent us materials to help all the prospective debaters prepare, and then held auditions in the style of the real competition, and we competed as a pair. We were so excited to learn that we had made it through to the next round after debating the statement 'war is never justified'. On Saturday 28th January, we (Prethika and Devanshi) were offered the chance to compete at the Cambridge Union School's Debate, taking place at the iconic Union Chamber.

Walking into the Union debate chamber was quite intimidating! Firstly, we were quite young in comparison to the majority of other sixth form teams, though there

were other teams our age and younger! Secondly, the debate chamber literally exuded

prestige – from Winston Churchill to the Dalai Lama, countless historical figures had been in that room, shaping the world we live in. Even the architecture had a majestic quality; the debating chamber had high chandeliers, tall windows, and even a thronelike chair for the debaters. It was remarkable, but also overwhelming. De-

To explain, "British Parliamentary" format is really just a fancy way to say that you have two sides, Proposition and Opposition, both with an Opening and Closing team – four teams in total.

The Union competition itself consists of receiving a random motion (a statement), having 15 minutes to come up with convincing 5-minute speeches and rebuttals, and, finally, debating the other schools. Naturally, the short time allowance means that you can't really use any statistics or research; it's a matter of trying to use *what you already know* to string together a cohesive argument. It's really high pressure, but you get used to it after the first round!




