Context

Keep an swimming!

The CCHS swimming pool was built in the 1960s, partly from funds raised by CCHS families. Dedicated upgrading and maintenance work over the years has ensured that the pool has served generations of students and young people across the Chelmsford community.

At the moment, our pool supports the PE curriculum for our 1,162 students, as well as nearly 200 pupils from five local primary schools, and nearly 600 young people from the wider community who use our pool with clubs.

Our swimming pool is truly a community pool.

Goal

Now is the time to modernise this important community resource to preserve it for future generations of students, pupils and young people. We are asking for your support now, just as the CCHS community rallied in the 1960s to ensure a pool was built, to help us achieve this important goal.

Fundraising

We estimate that the pool will require up to £250,000 over the next two years to bring it back to a suitable condition to support swimming in our community for the foreseeable future.

Our immediate need is to replace our aged boiler and gas pipework, which will cost approximately £35,000. 

Student reflection – Abigail (Year 9)

I joined Secondary Engineering Leaders Awards hoping to learn more about STEM, specifically engineering, and to try to create an idea myself. I was lucky enough to interview Mr Crane (an engineer at BAE systems) and a CCHS alumni (who has now joined BAE systems). I learnt about their journey into engineering and different sectors of engineering. To complete the project, I needed to write a letter about my designs and draw a diagram of my idea with annotations. This helped me think about the science behind the idea and to think of who could use my product. I enjoyed learning and understanding the key parts of engineering. This project has made me more confident in my skills and knowledge of STEM.





As part of our sixth form enrichment offering we encourage students to pursue avenues of interest within the wider discipline of economics. Part of this remit is to take part in essay competitions to undertake further reading and research and to flex their academic knowledge. Whilst it is still early in the annual calendar for of these competitions, as many of them open during the latter part of the summer term we are excited to celebrate the success of two Y12 Economics students, Manya, (12 AHN), and Emily, (12 DMI).

Manya was one of four thousand five hundred students who entered a competition run by Northeastern University London. Her choice to enter was driven by the question 'What are the most likely implications of the economic sanctions imposed on Russia?' Her research led her to conclude ' having not yet recuperated from a global pandemic, the toll of an economic war is felt by the broad swathe of countries who participate in it, due to the market interrelatedness of Eurasia. Whether the "besieged fortress" conceptual framework of Russia's economy is a factor that alters these implications, it is certain that the imposed sanctions are a driving force in causing less incomes, productivity, and growth. Manya received a commendation for her essay and was invited to a prize winner day at the university, which included a presentation of a medal and certificate by the university's CEO followed by an insightful discussion about studying economics at university.



Emily received a commendation for her entry in the inaugural Gerald O'Connell essay competition, launched by Fitzwilliam College Cambridge. She was one of only ten recipients of a commendation for her essay titled, 'In recent decades, the objective of UK monetary policy has been to deliver price stability and, subject to that, to support the government's economic objectives including those for growth and employment. In view of the challenges posed by climate change, should the remit of the Bank of England be amended?'

Emily's closing argument was: 'Extending the remit of any major governmental agency is not a decision to be taken lightly, however, in light of the unique challenges posed by climate change, the remit of the Bank of England should be altered to address them. Not only have other governmental agencies failed to effectively do so, facing the climate change emergency benefits the BoE directly. It is prudent for the BoE to minimise the number of climate-related shocks to maintain price stability and low and stable rates of inflation, as well as being able to achieve its objectives well into the future.' For her prize Emily has been invited to Cambridge to have a meeting with the Director of Studies for Economics Dr Anna Watson and to collect a certificate in acknowledgement of achievement.

Well done to both of you for such an inspiring achievement!



On Tuesday 20th June, Mayumi, (12AHN), presented at the Jack Petchey Speak Out Challenge event in central London.

Mayumi, who won the competition two years ago, gave a short speech and presented an award at the event, which celebrated the Speak Out Challenge having reached 250,000 young people and supported them in their public speaking.





On Tuesday 20th June, Year 12 attended an assembly celebrating this year's Mary Kenyon Poetry Prize.

The assembly welcomed guest speaker Caroline Kenyon, Mary's daughter-inlaw and one of the judges of the prize. Caroline spoke eloquently and with enthusiasm about our students' fantastic work and about Mary's life and times.

This year's winners, Fedora, (Year 12) and Kavya, (Year 11) gave beautiful readings of their poems 'Don't Spill the Tea' and 'Time', and were presented with their certificates and prizes of £100 each, donated by the Kenyon family.
