Teaching and Learning

Mr Selby, Assistant Headteacher, Teacher & Learning and Staff Development

There has been a shift in educational thinking over the past ten years. There are con-

stant debates amongst those who work in education and teaching about the power of knowledge vs. skills. Sir Francis Bacon famously coined the phrase 'knowledge is power'; he thought that knowledge is a powerful factor that empowers people to achieve great results. The more knowledge a person gains, the more powerful they become. However, others argue that skills are the key to a successful life. In a world where students are preparing for jobs that do not currently exist, it will be the skills they learn that determines their future successes.



Naturally, it is reasonable to consider that these disciplines hold equal weight in an educational context. Knowledge is theoretical. It's an intellectual understanding of information, or put simply, 'knowing the right answers'. Skills are practical. They are the actions people take to put their knowledge into practice. Students need a blend of both knowledge and skills to be successful. Without knowledge, they would not have an understanding of the content required to be successful in a formal examination; however, without the skills needed to articulate this in an exam context, they wouldn't be able to achieve all the marks on offer in the most effective way.





As a school, over the past couple of years, we have been considering ways in which we can use effective practices or techniques to compliment our students' outstanding knowledge and understanding, with the intention of enabling them to achieve their full potential. This led us to working with an organisation called **Elevate Education**. Elevate work with over 700 schools across the UK. Their sessions focus on utilising study skills to harbour and communicate knowledge. Elevate's study skills workshops and seminars are designed to achieve behavioural change amongst students.

Teaching and Learning

Sessions use educational research to inform students of the best strategies to maximise their successes. These sessions are run by university students and graduates who have a recent knowledge of putting the study skills they talk about in sessions into practice. At CCHS, we host Elevate to lead sessions on study skills, exam techniques and utilising study time. These are delivered to students across a range of year groups with the primary aim of enabling students to utilise their knowledge and brain capacity in a study or exam-based context.



We are also fortunate that our partnership with Elevate means that we can provide resources and access to a host of webinars for our parents. Recent sessions have focused on motivation, memory and resilience. Please look out for these advertised in our weekly bulletin 'The Laudatio'.

We look forward to working again with Elevate Education next year as we continue to develop our students' study skills.





The exhibition was not only an opportunity to appreciate the artistic talent of our students but also to display the inclusivity, respect, and understanding within our school community.








The Key Stage 3 Art Exhibition encouraged our young artists to express themselves authentically through their creations. It provided a platform for students to



Along with the many other diverse events celebrated within the CCHS community, it has turned very much into a tradition to celebrate Pride month within our school community. In the words of our Diversity Prefects, celebrating the month shows 'how teachers, school leaders and our students can actively support and advocate for equality and inclusivity in our

local community'.



That is why it is such an important month for our community to acknowledge and this year was no exception. This year we kicked off the month with an assembly led by our Change and Diversity Prefects which highlighted the importance of Pride month by looking at the origins of both the movement, and the pride flag. They also looked at Pride on a more local level by looking at events such as Essex Pride and advertising the school's first ever PrideFest. As is always customary on these occasions we flew the Pride flag with pride outside the school as a symbol of our commitment to every kind of diversity.

It has become a tradition of the school to hold a cake and badge sale during Pride month to help raise money for LGBTQ+ causes and this year the school decided to raise money for AKT. AKT is a charity that supports homeless LGBTQ+ people aged between 16 and 25 by helping them find temporary accommodation, ways out of hostile living environments and other housing support as well as developing other life skills. 24% of all homeless people are LGBTQ+ and 77% of these young homeless people believe that coming out at home was the main reason for them being asked to leave the family home.

As well as supporting such a worthwhile cause, this year instead of the usual cake and badge sale, we held our first ever PrideFest. A 'call to cake' was made, that our CCHS community answered, with the school awash with cakes to be sold, but along with that we had a celebratory atmosphere with music provided by Miss Hutton who performed some songs underneath the Abstract outside Bancroft which created a fun lunchtime, especially when some students joined in with the singing and one even did the caterpillar across the floor!

Of course, none of the events throughout the month would have been possible without the help and dedication of the Change and Diversity Prefects who worked tirelessly to organise and publicise the assembly and PrideFest. In today's diverse and evolving society, it is essential that schools work hard to create an inclusive environment for all students. By recognising and embracing all communities within schools, it is possible to create an atmosphere of acceptance, respect and understanding for everyone, which will all have an excellent impact on the wellbeing and academic success of students.

This has been another busy term for Drama, with a variety of in class and extracurricular events taking place. Year 10 Practical Examinations

Students in our Year 10 class completed the first element of the GCSE course in June. They are required, as part of the specification, to create a devised performance based around a specific stimulus. With this in mind, we began planning and creating our practical work back in March. Students chose to create and explore pieces of Drama around a range of stimuli, including: The Grimm Tales, The Persistence of Memory by Salvador Dali and the classic 'I Don't Like Mondays' by the Boomtown Rats.

Public History Society

KS3 students, particularly Year 7, have enjoyed attending Public History Society since it began in the Spring Term. We have looked at the way that we can engage in History outside of the classroom with the current term focusing on experimental archaeology, a professional discipline involving the recreation of ancient artifacts with the techniques that the original societies would have used to see what can be learnt from them. We have focused using clay to recreate wonderful items such as cuneiform using wedge tools (the most ancient form of writing), curse tablets based on those found in Roman Britain, and amphora which are found across the ancient Mediterranean.



When we return after the summer holiday, we will be starting from September with a focus on exhibition curation- starting with a visit from the Chelmsford Museum on Wednesday 13th September! A member of the outreach team will give a brief talk, bringing in various artefacts for us to handle, and host a Q&A session.









As we draw to the end of this academic year, I am delighted to share the impressive achievements of our students in recent competitions and events. Following the successful completion of their projects, our Industrial Cadets Bronze and Gold teams had the opportunity to attend the Celebration, Graduation and Awards Ceremony at University of Cambridge in June. Students had a fantastic experience of seeing their peers' projects, touring the Engineering Department, and listening to the talks by STEM professionals and Engineering students at Cambridge. The Year 9 Bronze team came joint first in the category 'Project of the Year' and the Year 12 Gold team-Seacole, led by Mrs Connolly and Dr Woodward, won the People's Choice Project Award and came second in the Best Teamwork category.

Electronics Club, run by Mr Nicholls, has seen groups from various years embrace the challenges of building circuitry for their projects. Year 8 students were busy making electronic dice this term. Students relished the task of making the four outputs display numbers between 1 and 6, ensuring the dice produces numbers that are truly random. Year 7 enjoyed making the door hangers and Year 9 have now completed building stereo amplifiers with a colour changing



sound-to-light display. Students in all year groups have gained new skills and knowledge including using the school's laser cutter. The commitment and enthusiasm shown by the students is truly inspiring.



The Electronics club also supported competitions such as the Chelmsford Science and

Engineering Society's TEXPO 2023 where the Rampaging Chariots team presented their radio-controlled robot 'Spirit of Boudicca'. Our students had worked incredibly hard enhancing the basic design to a technically advanced robot with four-wheel drive and switchable

settings for the various challenges of the obstacle course. This was much admired by both judges and other competitors earning them the Students Choice Award.

You may recall from the Autumn Term newsletter that seven of our Year 12 students were selected for the Empowered Females in STEM Programme, a six-month course by *UpSkill me*. In addition to the professional mentorship by companies such as Dyson and Google, students also worked with members from other schools around the UK on a project group competition, with the objective of progressing their employability skills.

Another resounding success came from our students who participated in the Secondary Engineers' Leaders Competition "If you were an Engineer, what would you do?". Seven of our student entries were awarded 'Distinction – shortlisted' in this competition that encourages young people to design a solution to a simple problem they encounter in their daily life. All the shortlisted posters from East of England were displayed at Anglia Ruskin University. Jess (11 S), Gini (10 S) and Abigail (9 A) received the Winners award in their year groups.

STEM Leaders' Programme is a new initiative that was launched to Year 9 during this academic year with an aim to develop skills in our young people to inspire, lead and mentor their peers through the creation and delivery of STEM activities. Dr Cannon and I were impressed by the dedication and commitment shown by the participants in organising and running a range of activities to Year 7 and 8 students during the past four weeks. We are hopeful that students who have completed all tasks will be awarded Level 1 qualification after the qualification assurance process which will take place in the next Autumn term.

I congratulate all the students who took part in various events and thank staff, mentors and parents who supported and guided them throughout their projects.

Empowered Females in STEM Programme

Last October, seven students from Sixth Form (Akshaya, Emma, Harny, Martha, Naomi, Ruth and Amal) started the Empowered Females in STEM programme. This was kicked off with a brilliant launch event at the Amazon headquarters, where we met our fellow scholars, a mentor from a top tech company and participated in fun and interesting activities to team build and explore STEM. During this event, we were also introduced to the Dyson challenge and the team members that that would be completing it with. The challenge asked us to design a solution for air pollution at home, school, or the journey to school.

This programme ran over six months, where we attended masterclasses each month to meet with our mentor and learn about different employability skills such as adaptability and building confidence. During this time, we also started to develop our solution to the Dyson Challenge. Within our teams of 3 or 4, we started to build an understanding of air pollution, the causes, the effects, and current solutions. We then spent time producing ideas for the challenge and began to design a solution, this could be in the form of an app, or a physical product. As part of the challenge, we had to produce a diagram of our idea or even a prototype. This allowed us to be imaginative and logical, developing our STEM skills.

After sixth months the programme came to a close and we had all finished the Dyson Challenge, but the experience was not fully over yet until the graduation event took place in London, at the EY building or the Salesforce (depending in which mentor group you were in). This event was a fantastic opportunity to reunite in person with our teammates as people came from all over the UK as well as have a final masterclass and reflect on our STEM journeys. This event also included the Dyson showcase where we presented our solutions with our diagrams and prototypes to a panel of judges as part of a competition with various categories such as best idea, best presentation, and best effort. It was great to

share our hard work with our mentor and fellow scholars and win prizes!

Overall, this programme has been an amazing experience, enabling us to learn more about careers in STEM and the skills required and to also meet like-minded people with similar interests and of course complete the Dyson challenge! Akshaya (12 DNO)




Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme

Congratulations to all of the students who completed their Bronze Award Qualifying Expedition in July. Throughout this year they have been working committedly to complete their Physical, Volunteering, and Skills sections, and it was fantastic to see them positively embrace the challenge of their Expedition earlier this month.

Below is a report written by one of the teams, detailing their experience.







During the weekend on the 1st and 2nd of July, we got the amazing experience of doing our Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Expedition. We walked a total of 20 miles across the two days and enjoyed the whole weekend; from the walking to spending time at the campsite. We found this to be an enjoyable experience and we would recommend it to anyone as it is a

great opportunity to spend time outdoors and learn more camping skills.

'1 2 3 4 5 6 7, WOO', was the chant that got us through each checkpoint of our expedition and made sure no one was lost. We each had a number that we shouted which acted to check if our group was together, so we could be certain we wouldn't lose anyone. Our chant brought optimism to our DofE which we found very helpful along our journey.

After our first day's walk, we returned to the campsite. We set up own tents and had 3 to share between our group of 7. When it came to food, we used trangias to heat up water on to cook our meals in the evening and morning.

Over both days, though it was tiring, there were many aspects of the journey that all of us enjoyed. This included the beautiful nature that we were constantly surrounded by, ranging from the endless fields to the animals such as dogs, cows and horses that we saw on the way. Top Tips For Your DoFE

If you ever do a Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Expedition, here are some tips to make sure you have as much fun as possible...

Always double check the map: This may seem obvious, but always double check where you're going and try not to just follow along with what your team says, even <u>if</u> they are sure. Make sure your whole team pauses until everyone agrees and take your time. This will increase your chance of not getting lost and sharing the job of map-reading.

Drink a lot: Especially if it's warm, but even during a cooler day you need to be drinking lots of water throughout the day, hydration is important!

Always cheer your friends on and don't get down if things go wrong: Making mistakes is the best way to learn and get better at what you are doing and staying positive always helps to give you a boost you along the way.

Share and check on your team: Being and having good teammates will go a long way so share if someone doesn't have something and always be checking on the other member of your team (even if it's little things like if everyone's wearing sun cream!).

Share the roles between everyone: Lots of other groups had specific roles for certain people but we found it beneficial for all of us to have a go at everything, for example we would always pass the maps around and each have a look to check where we were going. Sharing jobs means that everyone gets a go at everything!

What a very busy term we have had! With a large number of district, county & national competitions to take part in and with great success, came even more fixtures. Students had lots of opportunities to compete for the school in the various teams; allowing them to compete at the highest standard and proudly represent the school.

Athletics

ESAA Track & Field Cup 2023

With athletes having to compete in two events, students had to try lots of different events during training to find which would be best for them and the team to score as many points as possible. Selecting these teams are always very difficult as one combination could mean we reach Regional Finals, but another version might not.

With the ESAA T&F Cup being a national competition, it brings over fifty schools from the Essex area together to compete, resulting in over five first round competitions (unlike most areas who only have one or possibly two). As Essex is an extremely strong area, it is very difficult to reach the National as a winner of the Regional A Final, so the other schools have to go through as a highest scoring teams, resulting in at least four teams at the Nationals for all age groups. However, having previously been successful, we had high expectations and were determined to get as far as possible in the competition. With our Junior & Inter teams competing in Thurrock for the first round in May both teams did well and qualified for the regional finals. Our Junior team came forth with 358 points and qualified for the Regional A Final and our Inter team who competed well, finished sixth with 364 points & qualified for the Regional B Final.

Though our teams didn't qualify for the National round, they gave their absolute all and should be very proud of their performances with both improving their scores by over twenty points. The Inters performed extremely well at their competition and went on to win their B Final, an outstanding result.
