During the past 20 years teaching chemistry at CCHS, I have had the opportunity to observe a large number of students develop an interest in the subject that goes beyond simply what they need to know to pass the examinations. As Subject Leader for Chemistry, my role is to monitor the delivery of the chemistry course to all year groups, to ensure that standards are maintained and to provide support to students that require it.

The Department has always been a very popular one, especially in the Sixth Form, and it is always a pleasure to be able to encourage and support students who wish to study chemistry, or other related areas of science further. To aid in this, we have two thriving student led societies attached to the Department, the Biochemistry society and the Chemistry society. Part of my role also involved supporting students who wish to compete in various chemistry related competitions, these include the Cambridge Chemistry Challenge and the International Chemistry Olympiad, which are an excellent opportunity for the students to develop their interest in the subject.

I am supported by an excellent team of five other teachers of chemistry as well as a dedicated and highly efficient team of chemistry technicians, without which we would not be able to complete the wide range of practical work that we do at CCHS.

Context

The CCHS swimming pool was built in the 1960s, partly from funds raised by CCHS families. Dedicated upgrading and maintenance work over the years has ensured that the pool has served generations of students and young people across the Chelmsford community.

At the moment, our pool supports the PE curriculum for our 1,162 students, as well as nearly 200 pupils from five local primary schools, and nearly 600 young people from the wider community who use our pool with clubs.

Our swimming pool is truly a community pool.

Goal

Now is the time to modernise this important community resource to preserve it for future generations of students, pupils and young people. We are asking for your support now, just as the CCHS community rallied in the 1960s to ensure a pool was built, to help us achieve this important goal.

Fundraising

We estimate that the pool will require up to £250,000 over the next two years to bring it back to a suitable condition to support swimming in our community for the foreseeable future.

Our immediate need is to replace our aged boiler and gas pipework, which will cost approximately £35,000. We will be organising some sponsored events and other fundraising activities, however if you are able to support us with any amount, we have a fundraising page available at


Athlete of the Week is Charlotte, (8C), for her phenomenal work ethic, determination and skill level during the first round of the U14 Essex Hockey Championships.

Alexa competed in the combined Year 12/Year 13 category, winning silver in her debut Biathlon, with 2104 points - a qualifying score for the British Champs next year.








This week we received the results of the Senior Maths Challenge, completed by 49 students in the sixth form and 7 students in KS4 at the start of October.

CCHS achieved 15 Gold Awards, 22 Silver Awards and 10 Bronze Awards. The 15 students receiving Gold Awards have qualified for either the British Mathematics Olympiad (BMO), a demanding 3.5 hour olympiad for the top 1000 students nationally, or the Senior Kangaroo Round, intended for the next 5000 nationally. The two students through to the BMO are Hansika in Year 12 and Arthie in Year 11.

Qualifying for the BMO is no easy feat, but this is the first time a CCHS student from KS4 has qualified for an olympiad intended for the highest performing sixth form students; this is a real achievement. Congratulations to all students who took part!


