The origin of Politics lies in the debate of how to distribute limited resources, which in turn leads to the competition for power to distribute those resources. Certainly in recent times with the age of austerity, Brexit, the pandemic and now the cost of living crisis these debates have become more prevalent as we all look for the best way to manage the resources our country has. As co-subject leader for Politics it is my privilege to help and guide students in finding out the different ways across a wide political spectrum that this can be done.

The Politics Department at CCHS is one of the newest departments in the school. Originally formed in September 2016, Mr Warner and myself started out with just 11 students. Since then we have steadily grown to the point where we now have over 60 students taking the subject across Years 12 and 13 and have, in part at least, inspired some of our students to go onto study not just Politics, but PPE, International Relations and Human, Social and Political Science at a number of different universities.

Our curriculum, which focuses on UK and US Politics, aims to help students become independent thinkers as well as learners. We encourage and help students to articulate their arguments on both sides of a debate and use critical analysis in order for them to develop their own views as a result. We also encourage links within and outside the school. Our annual trip with our Year 12 students to the Houses of Parliament every December has become a much valued part of the school calendar and our students develop links and connections with other subjects through regular participation in the weekly Humanities Society.

As 2024 begins to appear on the horizon, bringing with it, an inevitable general election for the United Kingdom and a US Presidential election – which given the circumstances that currently surround Mr Trump, could potentially be the most controversial election in a long while, We think it is safe to say that it is an incredibly exciting time to study Politics.

Context

Keep on swimming!

The CCHS swimming pool was built in the 1960s, partly from funds raised by CCHS families. Dedicated upgrading and maintenance work over the years has ensured that the pool has served generations of students and young people across the Chelmsford community.

At the moment, our pool supports the PE curriculum for our 1,162 students, as well as nearly 200 pupils from five local primary schools, and nearly 600 young people from the wider community who use our pool with clubs.

Our swimming pool is truly a community pool.

Goal

Now is the time to modernise this important community resource to preserve it for future generations of students, pupils and young people. We are asking for your support now, just as the CCHS community rallied in the 1960s to ensure a pool was built, to help us achieve this important goal.

Fundraising

We estimate that the pool will require up to £250,000 over the next two years to bring it back to a suitable condition to support swimming in our community for the foreseeable future.






Ríona, (8A), competed in the International Ballroom Dance Championships this week.



IoP – CSES Lecture at CCHS

On Friday 26th September, CCHS had the opportunity to host another early edition of the Institute of Physics public lecture on the topic 'Imaging the Universe'. The lecture delivered by Martin Bracken, a lifelong amateur astronomer, was well-attended by members of the CCHS community and neighbouring schools.

"I always thought that producing detailed images of galaxies and nebulae millions of light years away was only possible for large telescopes in remote locations - it is hard to believe that you can obtain these images from areas with such poor weather and light pollution, like Chelmsford! Obtaining such images is actually quite complex - naturally, there is a lot of equipment with expensive technology required, but the processing of the images is also a vital part to producing them - the images must be stacked, calibration frames need to be added and electronic noise must also be removed, which can be time consuming! The whole procedure was explained in a clear and concise manner (which made it easier to understand) - I really enjoyed learning about it!"
