In my role as Subject Leader for Psychology, I am fortunate to teach a large number of students in Year 12 and Year 13. I have enjoyed the enthusiasm I have found in many students and their keenness to achieve highly. I was particularly pleased with a student in the recent cohort who found the subject difficult throughout her studies but succeeded in achieving an A grade in the final exams. It reminded me of the importance of valuing the journey that every student is on and never giving up hope. Observing Year 12 students developing and conducting their own psychological research demonstrated the range of interests and skills our students possess. Listening to their presentations is an enjoyable experience and one I am looking forward to this year.

My other role as Global Citizenship Coordinator is developing. So many of the systems and events so well embedded here were completely new to me. Context

Keep on swimming!

The CCHS swimming pool was built in the 1960s, partly from funds raised by CCHS families. Dedicated upgrading and maintenance work over the years has ensured that the pool has served generations of students and young people across the Chelmsford community.

At the moment, our pool supports the PE curriculum for our 1,162 students, as well as nearly 200 pupils from five local primary schools, and nearly 600 young people from the wider community who use our pool with clubs.

Our swimming pool is truly a community pool.

Goal

Now is the time to modernise this important community resource to preserve it for future generations of students, pupils and young people. We are asking for your support now, just as the CCHS community rallied in the 1960s to ensure a pool was built, to help us achieve this important goal.

Fundraising

We estimate that the pool will require up to £250,000 over the next two years to bring it back to a suitable condition to support swimming in our community for the foreseeable future.

Our immediate need is to replace our aged boiler and gas pipework, which will cost approximately £35,000. The International Coalition of Girls' Schools

In July 2022, CCHS became one of the founding UK schools of the International Coalition of Girls' Schools (ICGS). ICGS is now the leading advocate for girls' schools globally.

The work of ICGS is to advance the mission of girls' schools. Girls' schools play a vital role in educating and empowering girls, which is essential to overcoming our world's greatest challenges, from climate change to human rights, from global health to sustainable human development. The purpose of ICGS is to nurture the girls who will become the indispensable women leaders of tomorrow. We, at CCHS, will continue our work and commitment to excellence in girls' education and empowerment. When it comes to girls' education, there is always more we can do, together.

This week we explore the research and impact of girls' schools nationally and internationally. Please see below three important statistics which outline the important role of girls' education.

Girls' school graduates impact their communities.

When compared to coeducated peers, graduates of girls' school are more likely to:

become involved in environmental programs

- · deem it essential to participate in community social action programs
- be frequently active in volunteer work

Girls' schools empower students to become bold leaders.

· At girls' schools, girls demonstrate great confidence in female leadership and become increasingly interested in leadership positions themselves. Data suggests that girls at coeducational schools actually become less interested in leadership positions with age.

· Programs at girls' schools focus on the development of teamwork over other qualities of leadership, while the qualities of confidence, compassion, and resilience also ranked prominently. • 93% of girls' school graduates say they were offered greater leadership opportunities than coeducated peers and 80% have held leadership positions since graduating from high school.
