Over the last eight years at CCHS working as a Spanish teacher, I have had the privilege to teach my native language to students that wish to start learning a new language in Year 10. Teaching Spanish as an accelerated GCSE course is both intense and very rewarding: students feel they are progressing fast and, in just under two years, they achieve excellent outcomes, coping well with the challenges that an accelerated course brings. By the end of the course many will feel confident to continue their Spanish journey not only to A Level but also onto different universities including Oxford and Cambridge.

Being a native teacher of Spanish, I particularly enjoy teaching Spanish A level as this means I get to teach a wide range of the topics that refer to very current issues in Spain, the culture, the history, and the society that I am part of. I also enjoy guiding students with their Independent Research Projects and encouraging them to broaden their knowledge about the wider Spanish speaking world by exploring issues in Latin America and, as a bonus, I always learn something new from their presentations and research.

When I am not in the classroom, I am always exploring new enrichment opportunities for my students. For the last few years, I have organized and led the trip to the Cervantes Theatre in London to watch the performance in Spanish of one of the plays that we study as part of the A level course.

As the subject leader of Spanish and the sole member of this department, I am responsible for everything Spanish: from reviewing and creating schemes of work and assessment opportunities, to ensuring that students are challenged and supported. With a new, more accessible, more inclusive and more relevant Modern Languages GCSE specification coming to effect from September 2024, it is fair to say that there has never been a better time to learn a modern language and I am excited to see our students being part of an ever growing community of over 500 million Spanish speakers globally.

Keep on suing!

Context

The CCHS swimming pool was built in the 1960s, partly from funds raised by CCHS families. Dedicated upgrading and maintenance work over the years has ensured that the pool has served generations of students and young people across the Chelmsford community.

At the moment, our pool supports the PE curriculum for our 1,162 students, as well as nearly 200 pupils from five local primary schools, and nearly 600 young people from the wider community who use our pool with clubs.

Our swimming pool is truly a community pool.

Goal

Now is the time to modernise this important community resource to preserve it for future generations of students, pupils and young people. We are asking for your support now, just as the CCHS community rallied in the 1960s to ensure a pool was built, to help us achieve this important goal.

Fundraising

We estimate that the pool will require up to £250,000 over the next two years to bring it back to a suitable condition to support swimming in our community for the foreseeable future.

Our immediate need is to replace our aged boiler and gas pipework, which will cost approximately £35,000.



On Wednesday 15th November, fifteen of our Year 12 students had the opportunity to attend STEM Conference at Chelmsford Cathedral. The event was organised by Drapers' Academy in collaboration with Chelmsford Science and Engineering Society (CSES) and Chelmsford Cathedral. Students attended lectures of speakers from both medical and engineering background, with further reference to careers and information across the STEM subjects.

Relativity

An IOP / CSES lecture for the public, presented by Danny Thomas

The proof for many scientific theories can be found out in the universe and this is particularly true of Einstein's theories of relativity. Danny Thomas was a child of the Apollo missions and developed an early interest in space, astronomy and science, which led to a degree in Physics from Nottingham University in the 1980s. Over the years, he has maintained his interest in astronomy and physics, combining them in talks to astronomy societies and other interested groups. A key aim for his talk on Special and General Relativity is to explain the theories in a logical way to make the fundamentals accessible to a wide audience. The talk using animations and graphics to explain the concepts avoiding complex maths and the often confusing paradoxes that arise from travelling close to light speed. No prior knowledge is required for this talk which will explain how we all experience relativity every day!

Last Friday, I had the privilege of attending the UK Youth Parliament's annual meeting at the House of Commons on the behalf of Essex. Back in April, I had the privilege of being elected as the Youth MP for Braintree and Uttlesford (which is already currently represented by MPs Priti Patel, James Cleverly and Kemi Badenoch) which, after a few more conferences in locations across the country such as Leeds, has led up to the events of last Friday. For the past two years, we have been working towards pushing forward a new bill to parliament, with the current title of our campaign being 'Food for Learning'. Our goal is to ensure that all young people under the age of 18 will receive free school meals, and that all economically underprivileged young people will receive extra monetary support in order to have access to healthy, nutritious food during the holidays and for other meals aside from lunch.



I arrived at Westminster in the morning with the other Youth MPs from Essex, before filing into Westminster Hall, the famous 900 year old building that had seen the trials of notable historical figures such as Guy Fawkes and King Charles I, as well as the lying in state of Queen Elizabeth II, Sir Winston Churchill, the Queen Mother and King George IV and numerous events such as the Queen's Jubilees. Thus, it felt fairly surreal to enter into such a huge hall after leaving their intensive security checks, and wandering into the impressive stained glass and looming pillars (which had been untouched ever since it was first built in the Medieval period) in order to reconnect with friends I'd met at past conferences, and to nibble at a few pastries. Here, we got the chance to meet the Speaker of the House of Commons, Sir Lindsay Hoyle, and the debate leads for the event were even allowed to meet his cat, Attlee, notably seen on its own Instagram account.



After an hour of conversing with other YMPs, we were taken down St. Stephen's Hall and into the House of Commons, which was much smaller than you see on TV! Here, the debate began- we debated upon and delivered speeches across a wide range of topics, trying to figure out our priority for the bill. We also had overseas representatives from Commonwealth nations and Crown Dependencies, such as Trinidad and Tobago, the Falkland Islands and the Isle of Man. After some further debating, we received speeches from a variety of MPs such as Penny Mordaunt (Leader of the House of Commons and Lord President of Parliament) and John Nicolson (an SNP politician and was the first BBC presenter in history to come out as gay), before receiving a message from the prime minister Rishi Sunak. Then came the vote- we had a range of options for topics we wanted to prioritise, but overall we decided to prioritise the funding and finances for our bill.



Of course, our job isn't quite done- after the events of last Friday, our bill will be passed onto the main Parliament of the United Kingdom, in order for the bill to finally be passed. But for now, all of us can rest easy knowing that we've learned important life skills from this event and our participation in the Youth Parliament- such as networking, public speaking and confidence- and that we've made a change in the laws of the United Kingdom by using our voices as the youth to help others in our age range across the nation.

Her affirming advice grounds us in these anxiety-producing times and gives us permission "not to worry alone."
