This spotlight feature acts as a mechanism to showcase to our school community the ongoing professional development work undertaken by our talented staff.

PGA Careers Leadership University of Warwick.

In the 2022 - 2023 academic year I undertook a qualification to develop my skills in my work as Higher Education Adviser. The process involved research, online lessons and meetings with other people also working in Careers weekly and culminated in a 5000-word essay about my research. The course was taught around The Gatsby Benchmarks, and about the facets of excellent Careers Leadership. These are 8 benchmarks that all education providers are encouraged to adhere to. At CCHS, Dr. Hiner, Dr. Palmer and myself regularly reflect on these to improve our provision. My research focused on Benchmark 3 (Addressing the Needs of Each Student) and Benchmark 8 (Personal Guidance).

For Benchmark 3, I focused on the provision we have in place for students with SEND needs and ensuring the most able students are supported. I found that as a school, as we have moved beyond the COVID-19 pandemic, our provision had returned to the earlier work we did, but with a more flexible approach. We now support students in online interviews, as universities have evolved this process as well. Dr Sam Lucy also speaks to parents and students about Oxford and Cambridge remotely. We are flexible with support for individuals and have worked closely with the SENDCO, previously Mrs. Adams, and now Miss. Pocock, to ensure students are supported.

Benchmark 8, Personal Guidance has additional challenges, because students must be able to forge their own path. To support this the Sixth Form met regularly to research and discuss Unifrog, a holistic careers platform. As a school we chose to invest in this to give students and parents all the information that they need to may informed choices about the students' futures. Students can take personality quizzes, see the chances of them receiving an offer from university based on their A Levels, and get support about future careers. It also gives parents the agency that they told us they would like - to do their own research, while still allowing the students the independence they needed as they make their first truly adult decisions. In 2023 - 2024 the Careers Team will be onboarding all year groups to Unifrog, giving all year groups the opportunities to find out more.

The PGA allowed me to not only evaluate our provision, but also reflect on the fantastic contributions that all the staff make to support our students, but also that parents and alumni make through careers evenings, mock interviews, enrichment days, and much more.




### **Author Visit**

Payment can be made using ParentPay, and the books will be given to the students on 8th March, when Sam will be happy to sign them.



Experience supernatural horrors as the contestants enter and search the deadly domicile. And wait with bated breath to see who emerges the winner... and who emerges the loser...



# Keep on suing!

#### Context

The CCHS swimming pool was built in the 1960s, partly from funds raised by CCHS families. Dedicated upgrading and maintenance work over the years has ensured that the pool has served generations of students and young people across the Chelmsford community.

At the moment, our pool supports the PE curriculum for our 1,162 students, as well as nearly 200 pupils from five local primary schools, and nearly 600 young people from the wider community who use our pool with clubs.

Our swimming pool is truly a community pool.

#### Goal

Now is the time to modernise this important community resource to preserve it for future generations of students, pupils and young people. We are asking for your support now, just as the CCHS community rallied in the 1960s to ensure a pool was built, to help us achieve this important goal.

### **Fundraising**

We estimate that the pool will require up to £250,000 over the next two years to bring it back to a suitable condition to support swimming in our community for the foreseeable future.

Our immediate need is to replace our aged boiler and gas pipework, which will cost approximately £35,000.
