We are fortunate to work with a range of colleagues who have recently engaged with, or continue to engage with, external agencies to support their professional development. This not only supports in developing their role in our school, or developing their work as classroom practitioners, but also enables us as a wider school community to engage with educational research to improve our whole school practices. This spotlight feature acts as a mechanism to showcase to our school community the ongoing professional development work undertaken by our talented staff.

Mr Selby

Hello, I'm Miss White and I am a completing my Teacher Training (ITT) in English at CCHS.

During my training at school, I have been well-supported in all aspects of my professional development. Across the year I have attended a weekly CPD meeting, which has been tailored to help broaden the teaching toolkit of ITTs and ECTs. Weekly CPD meetings focus on a variety of areas, from how to maintain school ethos, to supporting More Able learners, to thinking about new ways to implement high-impact, student-centered teaching. As a direct result of these sessions, I have integrated new tasks into my classroom, such as meta-memory techniques and tasks, and 'still and drill' to promote an ethos of challenge and student-led thinking in the classroom. The goal of each lesson is to provide students with the scaffolding and motivation to develop their own knowledge and thinking skills, and, ultimately, to become curious independent learners.

Alongside these CPD sessions, I have been provided with a subject specialist mentor. As part of the weekly timetable, both my mentor and I have an hour of time dedicated to providing constructive feedback on my teaching and overall training journey. During each session, my mentor and I discuss how my practice has developed, but also how I can continue to refine my teaching on a subject specific level. English across both Key Stage 3 and Key Stage 4 is unique in that it demands students to be creative, evaluative, and analytical all at once, thus discussions about how to ensure that every student succeeds in each element of the subject is key.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my time training at CCHS so far; I have felt very privileged to be able to teach so many bright young people.






The leader of learning at the V&A also told us that our team were one vote away from winning the Student Choice Award, which was a shame, but still so pleased with what they have achieved.

#### Virtual work experience (Years 10-13)

Whatever path your teen might want to take (or even if they don't know yet) work experience is a great addition to their CV and helps them stand out from others. Face-to-face work experience is great, and since Covid, many firms offer virtual work experience too, where your teen can find out how it feels to be part of the working world, from the comfort of their bedroom!

Many schools have a dedicated "work experience week" for certain years in the summer term, but don't let your teen wait until then to register interest – because the best opportunities can go quickly. #### **National Apprenticeship Event (Years 10-13)**

If you're located in Birmingham, Cardiff, London, Manchester, or Newcastle, you can look forward to The National Apprenticeship & School Leaver Event happening throughout the year. Students can get independent careers advice because the event will feature a host of employers and training providers on hand to talk to people face-to-face about apprenticeships and other careers choices. It's free to attend, open to all (including parents/carers) but booking is essential. The National Apprenticeship Event.

#### Options at 16 - The Extended Project Qualification (Years 12-13)

Many schools and colleges offer the Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) which is a dissertation or project created on the basis of independent research. It is a Level 3 qualification usually taken in Year 12 or 13 and can help to encourage independent learning and prepare students for university or further study. It can also be a useful way for your teen to increase their UCAS points.

#### What are the benefits of doing an EPQ?

- It can give your teen academic confidence
- It can help them prepare for further education
- It can help your child demonstrate passion for a topic or subject particularly helpful if they are applying for an apprenticeship or university course in the same subject area as their EPQ.
- It can be a useful talking point during an interview
- It can help your child develop key skills, which are useful in the workplace; and
- It can be incredibly rewarding!

# Keep on suing!

#### Context

The CCHS swimming pool was built in the 1960s, partly from funds raised by CCHS families. Dedicated upgrading and maintenance work over the years has ensured that the pool has served generations of students and young people across the Chelmsford community.

At the moment, our pool supports the PE curriculum for our 1,162 students, as well as nearly 200 pupils from five local primary schools, and nearly 600 young people from the wider community who use our pool with clubs.

Our swimming pool is truly a community pool.

#### Goal

Now is the time to modernise this important community resource to preserve it for future generations of students, pupils and young people. We are asking for your support now, just as the CCHS community rallied in the 1960s to ensure a pool was built, to help us achieve this important goal.

### **Fundraising**

We estimate that the pool will require up to £250,000 over the next two years to bring it back to a suitable condition to support swimming in our community for the foreseeable future.

Our immediate need is to replace our aged boiler and gas pipework, which will cost approximately £35,000.
