MESSAGE FROM MR LAWLOR

Last week, Dr Palmer and several Prefects delivered assemblies on the theme of charity. This included two of our Global Citizenship Prefects, Nina and Shriya, who spoke about our work with a local charity CHESS (Churches Homeless Emergency Support Scheme). I note below some of the key points from their excellent assembly, which speak to the great spirit of altruism and generosity that we witness from our students and CCHS families more broadly:

- Nationally 309,000 people were (according to Shelter) homeless in December 2023. People become homeless for many different reasons, including leaving home unemployment, financial struggle, domestic abuse and substance addiction. In the research which our Prefects conducted, homelessness was described as making people feel lonely, scared and helpless, with many saying the worst part was feeling that no one cared. However, one video they watched featured a gentleman who had been helped by the CHESS collection and he described how receiving a gift had really picked him up. Gifts large and small can have a positive impact and we are keen to do as much as possible to support CHESS, so as we can be part of spreading hope and care.
- CHESS started in the 1990s to offer shelter to homeless people in the winter and soon became a year-round night shelter. They now have one main building and several 'move on' houses. They aim to support homeless people by providing them accommodation and help through activities such as art therapy and job coaching.
- CCHS has supported the CHESS Christmas present collection for decades. There will be boxes in form rooms for donations between 18th November and 9th December. The best gifts are small generic things such as hats, gloves, scarves, chocolates, sweets and good quality hygiene products. The people who receive these gifts are mostly adult men so this should be borne in mind. Please do not wrap your gifts as they will be sorted, wrapped and labelled once we have finished collecting. Please spend no more than £5 on a gift.
- The Global Citizenship Officials look forward to receiving your gifts and are sure that their eventual recipients will be very grateful to receive them.

Beyond a wholesome discipline, be gentle with yourself. You are a child of the universe no less than the trees and the stars; you have a right to be here.

And whether or not it is clear to you, no doubt the universe is unfolding as it should. Therefore be at peace with God, whatever you conceive Him to be. And whatever your labors and aspirations, in the noisy confusion of life, keep peace in your soul. With all its sham, drudgery and broken dreams, it is still a beautiful world. Be cheerful. Strive to be happy.

On Friday 15th Miss S Sales and Miss Burnham took our Senior Girls' Swimming Team to the 66th ESSA Secondary Schools' Team Championship, held at Sandwell Aquatics Centre in Birmingham, with the competition taking place on Saturday 17th. The four team members were: Kesia (Yr11), Gracie (Yr12), Alexa (Yr13) and Sophie (Yr13). To gain a place in these prestigious finals, you had to be in the top 24 schools nationally. The CCHS Team went into the competition 10th fastest in both the freestyle relay and the medley relay, which was already a great achievement. On Saturday they had the freestyle relay first.

The team swam incredibly fast, finishing the heat in 1:54.87. This time got the team a spot in the final, where we were swimming alongside schools such as Millfield School, Repton School and Mount Kelly College, as well as Olympians. There were only 4 state schools in the final. The CCHS Team girls swam hard and fast, finishing 10th in the final. An hour later, it was time for the medley relay, where the team swam 2:08. The team finished 17th overall in that competition. CCHS has never had a Senior Girls' Team at the National Finals before, so not only did the team finish 10th and 17th fastest in the country in the relays, but they also made history in our school.

As the PE Department colleagues rightly note: "we are so incredibly proud of these four students; you gave us everything and more. Not only did we show up and give it everything on the day and make history, but we have also made memories for life, so thank you." What incredible young women they are – the school community salutes and congratulates them!

This lecture covers the use of the latest remote sensing technologies to convert standard wind instruments into digital reversible hybrid versions.

Unlike many other instruments, the saxophone, clarinet and flute cannot be easily silenced with a mute for quiet practice. But it's possible to quieten them by changing the way they respond to the player's breath, and by using

modern methods to detect the positions of his/her fingers, the user can hear a quiet digitally-synthesised version of their playing.

We look at the physics underlying these methods, the challenges involved in producing a viable device based on them, along with practical demonstrations of the resulting products.



Keep on suing!

Context

The CCHS swimming pool was built in the 1960s, partly from funds raised by CCHS families. Dedicated upgrading and maintenance work over the years has ensured that the pool has served generations of students and young people across the Chelmsford community.

At the moment, our pool supports the PE curriculum for our 1,162 students, as well as nearly 200 pupils from five local primary schools, and nearly 600 young people from the wider community who use our pool with clubs.

Our swimming pool is truly a community pool.

Goal

Now is the time to modernise this important community resource to preserve it for future generations of students, pupils and young people. We are asking for your support now, just as the CCHS community rallied in the 1960s to ensure a pool was built, to help us achieve this important goal.

Fundraising

We estimate that the pool will require up to £250,000 over the next two years to bring it back to a suitable condition to support swimming in our community for the foreseeable future.

Our immediate need is to replace our aged boiler and gas pipework, which will cost approximately £35,000.
