Dear CCHS Community,

RE: Arrival at and departure from school

Further to my communication with you last term, we continue to receive feedback from local residents about their experiences during student arrival and departure periods.

Local residents have raised concerns about some parents parking inappropriately, e.g. across their driveways, and dangerously, e.g. on footpaths.

I ask for your continued vigilance and co-operation, please, to ensure that if you are dropping off or collecting your daughter, you remain mindful of the local residents around the school, including First Avenue, Corporation Road, Swiss Avenue, Westfield Avenue and Elms Drive.

Senior colleagues recently met with Elms Drive residents, who expressed concern about the congestion in the road during school arrival and departure times. We have contacted Chelmsford City Council about the use of Rectory Lane car park. I note below information from them which may be helpful to families:

"Please be advised there is a standard five-minute grace period on all vehicles to allow the purchase of a pay and display ticket. Therefore, any vehicles that are in the car park for the purposes of dropping off and / or picking up should fall within that grace period."

Thank you, in advance, for your support with these matters. Yours faithfully, Mr Lawlor.



Industrial Cadets Gold Project – Visit to the Dyson Centre, University of Cambridge


The Gold Industrial Cadets Project gave us a valuable opportunity to work on a real engineering project, with creative freedom and guidance from industry professionals. This experience allowed us to understand what it's truly like to work as engineers, with the realization that setbacks are a common part of the process. The highlight of our journey was our two-day visit to the Dyson Centre at the University of Cambridge, where we made significant progress on our project using advanced equipment.

Before the visit, we had no physical models of our project, but thanks to the state-of-the-art machinery and support from technicians at Cambridge, we were able to bring our ideas to life. We learned how to use metal bending machines and lathes, which helped us solve challenges like fixing incorrect wheels and creating a metal holder for motors. We went through multiple prototypes to ensure the design worked as planned, gaining hands-on experience that we wouldn't have had access to at school.

In addition to working on our project, we also toured the Department of Engineering at Cambridge, where we learned about cutting-edge research, including efforts to reduce the carbon footprint of long-haul vehicles and a solar-powered car built by students. These projects inspired us and deepened our understanding of sustainable engineering.

Overall, the Industrial Cadets project taught us invaluable skills in teamwork, problem-solving, and engineering design. We've gained insights into both the practical aspects of engineering and the broader career opportunities within the sector, which will be beneficial as we continue to pursue future projects and professional growth.

Chelmsford County High School for Girls

Keep on suimming!

Context

The CCHS swimming pool was built in the 1960s, partly from funds raised by CCHS families. Dedicated upgrading and maintenance work over the years has ensured that the pool has served generations of students and young people across the Chelmsford community.

At the moment, our pool supports the PE curriculum for our 1,162 students, as well as nearly 200 pupils from five local primary schools, and nearly 600 young people from the wider community who use our pool with clubs.

Our swimming pool is truly a community pool.

Goal

Now is the time to modernise this important community resource to preserve it for future generations of students, pupils and young people. We are asking for your support now, just as the CCHS community rallied in the 1960s to ensure a pool was built, to help us achieve this important goal.

Fundraising

We estimate that the pool will require up to £250,000 over the next two years to bring it back to a suitable condition to support swimming in our community for the foreseeable future.

Our immediate need is to replace our aged boiler and gas pipework, which will cost approximately £35,000.
