MESSAGE FROM MR LAWLOR

On Tuesday, we held our second Enrichment Day across the school. These days provide opportunities for year groups to engage in activities to broaden their interests and experiences. As a whole, our Enrichment Days programme is designed to complement our taught curriculum, enabling students to work in different ways, with different teachers and, at times, with visitors.

Our challenge model, which our NACE (National Association for Able Children in Education) colleagues noted in their Challenge Award accreditation report, provides the framework for how we identify and pursue multiple opportunities for our students in each key stage. Our challenge model has seven elements:

Scheduled: habitual challenge, e.g. daily lesson activities

Extension: amplified challenge, e.g. Parental Support Booklet activities Years 7-9 booklets

Enrichment: deep challenge, e.g. Enrichment Day activities

Overarching: cohesive challenge, e.g. Internationalism activities

Excellence: examination challenge, e.g. GCSEs, the HPQ, A levels, the EPQ

Ancillary: complementary challenge, e.g. extra-curricular activities

Innovation: novel challenge, e.g. special projects


The team is now looking forward to preparing a new case for the regional round of the competition which will take place in the summer.

Careers Talk: Degree Apprenticeships - Akshaya Lakshmi Gopal



Dear CCHS Community,

RE: Update - arrival at and departure from school

We continue to engage with local residents (First Avenue, Corporation Road, Swiss Avenue, Westfield Avenue and Elms Drive) concerning their experiences during student arrival and departure periods.

Further to my communications on this matter last term and last month, I note below key points of information to support CCHS families:

- Chelmsford City Council provided the following about the use of Rectory Lane car park: "Please be advised there is a standard five-minute grace period on all vehicles to allow the purchase of a pay and display ticket. Therefore, any vehicles that are in the car park for the purposes of dropping off and / or picking up should fall within that grace period."
- As a result of the concerns raised by local residents regarding instances of inconsiderate and at times dangerous parking, South Essex Parking Partnership noted that their Parking Enforcement Team will be stepping up their patrols in the area.
- Our School Eco Committee is undertaking work, supported by the local authority, to explore how students travel to and from school, and how we could support both school families and the wider community with matters of travel, parking and congestion.
- Our Senior Leadership Team is working with local officials and local politicians on the matter of parking and congestion, and we have made suggestions to support this work, including the idea of creating a new entrance/exit point to the school site on the Chelmer Valley Road (east side of the campus).

Thank you, as ever, for your support in ensuring that we are mindful of local residents, as we work to keep people safe and relations cordial.





Destructive and non-destructive materials analysis techniques

What do jet engines, foldable touch screen phones, nuclear power plants, meteorites and drinks cans have in common? The answer: material science.

Material science and engineering is an incredibly broad and fascinating area of study that is essential in most areas of modern life. This interdisciplinary science looks at how the structure of atoms on a micro scale affect the properties of a material as a whole (after all, coal and diamonds are made of the same atoms). But how do we know what atoms and atomic structures are present in a given material? In this talk, Dr. Alex Foden takes you on a tour of analysis techniques used in modern day material science, what they can be used to show. And how they can work in tandem to understand the world around us.

Keep on suimming!

Context

The CCHS swimming pool was built in the 1960s, partly from funds raised by CCHS families. Dedicated upgrading and maintenance work over the years has ensured that the pool has served generations of students and young people across the Chelmsford community.

At the moment, our pool supports the PE curriculum for our 1,162 students, as well as nearly 200 pupils from five local primary schools, and nearly 600 young people from the wider community who use our pool with clubs.

Our swimming pool is truly a community pool.

Goal

Now is the time to modernise this important community resource to preserve it for future generations of students, pupils and young people. We are asking for your support now, just as the CCHS community rallied in the 1960s to ensure a pool was built, to help us achieve this important goal.

Fundraising

We estimate that the pool will require up to £250,000 over the next two years to bring it back to a suitable condition to support swimming in our community for the foreseeable future.

Our immediate need is to replace our aged boiler and gas pipework, which will cost approximately £35,000.
