
UCAS at CCHS


In the current 2024-2025 cycle, 150+ applications have been made to UCAS.

The students have applied to a wide range of universities.

Popular subjects include: Computer Science, Architecture, English Literature, Geography, Law, Medicine, Politics, Psychology.

Students have applied to a wide range of universities including Kings College London, Imperial, Oxford, Cambridge, UCL, Bath, LSE, and more!





What is UCAS and how do we use it?

The University and College Application Service

It is a portal that allows students to apply for higher education in one place.

Every student applying to UK universities uses this portal.

This year students will be able to apply for apprenticeships alongside university courses.

The UCAS Process

- Students can apply to up to 5 university courses per cycle.
- If a student wishes to do any of the following:
 - Study at Oxford or Cambridge,
 - Study Medicine, Dentistry, or Veterinary Medicine

They become an "Early Entrant". This means that they must apply earlier than everyone else. The in-school deadline is for this is late September.

- This is because these courses require interviews and pre-interview assessments.
- Everyone else applies by January.
- Everyone can also apply for apprenticeships at the same time.
- If a student is in receipt of Free School Meals, they do not have to pay for their application. Otherwise it is £28.50



How do students choose their course?

Students need to consider whether the career at the end of education or the subject is their main motivator. There is no right or wrong answer here.


If it is the **career**, then students should look at relevant courses, if necessary.

It is the **subject**, then students should reflect on the many options within that.

Career

Students should consider:

- Why does that job appeal to them?
- Do they have to read a specific subject
 - o e.g. Medicine, Dentistry etc
 - or can they read any subject that they like and do a conversion course at the end e.g. Law, Education and Finance.
- Has the student done relevant work experience?
- Have they considered apprenticeships as well as degrees?



What is an apprenticeship?

- An apprenticeship is an opportunity to work and study at the same time. Most of your time is spent doing on-the-job training, and the rest is spent working towards a qualification. Apprentices are paid a salary and be part of a team, just like a standard employee, but you'll also get dedicated study time throughout the week.
- The qualification achieved could vary from the equivalent to GCSEs, to a master's degree depending on the level of apprenticeship. There are different types or levels of apprenticeships depending on where you are in the UK. Each level apprenticeship will have different entry requirements; degree apprenticeships are the highest (and most competitive and well remunerated) level.

Degree vs. Apprenticeships

Degree

- Immerse yourself in your favourite subject.
- Don't have to be committed to one pathway.
- Live independently.
- Move on to further study.

Apprenticeships

- Degree apprenticeships give you a degree at work at the same time.
- Spend some time in university and the rest of the time at work.
- Earn while you learn.

Apprenticeships How do students apply?

Applying for an apprenticeship is just like applying for a normal job. Here's what you need to know:

Students can use UCAS, to apply for Degree Apprenticeships.

Apprenticeships don't follow the same deadlines as applying to university, the deadline is down to the employer

Students can apply directly through the employer

Students are not restricted to one apprenticeship application; you can do as many as you like

Subject

- Do they have a career in mind?
- Are they thinking of joint or single honours?
 - What other subject will complement their subject?
- Do they need to study in a particular setting?
 - Conservatoire
 - Specific university



How should students select their university?

- Predicted grades the entry requirements should be seen as a minimum for the most competitive universities.
- **Style** from the traditional, with a focus on subject-based courses and research, to modern universities, with a greater focus on vocational courses.
- Location some are based in large cities, others in smaller towns a major influence on the environment and lifestyle.
- **Size** larger universities can have more than 20,000 students, whereas some of the smallest have only a few thousand.
- Culture and facilities influenced by a range of factors, including the diversity of students who attend.
- What graduates do all universities collect destination statistics. It can be interesting to find out the types of jobs or further study students go on to.
- Tuition fees can vary between course providers. Check if there are any scholarships or bursaries available.
- Living costs accommodation, transport, and food can vary enormously

The UCAS Application

- Students will apply with key requirements:
 - Predicted grades
 - Personal Statement
 - School references
- Some universities will use these to invite people to interview,
- Some universities will use these to make offers.

It is worth noting that some universities also look at GCSE averages as well (best 8 average).

Predicted grades

- In a competitive market, meeting the entry requirements of the university course is essential.
- In many cases, students need to **exceed** the entry requirements for the best universities.
- Overpredicting now can lead to disappointment later.



Changes to the 2025 UCAS personal statement

Universities & colleges will consider

- Have students chosen the course for the right reasons?
- Do students have a depth of interest in the subject?
- Do students appear motivated and committed?
- Can students study independently?
- Are students genuinely engaged and knowledgeable about the area students are applying to?






- Students do not need to see them – they are not used in interviews.







Enter a general statement about your school/college/centre.

If applicable, enter any information about extenuating circumstances which may have impacted the applicant's education and achievement.

Outline any other supportive information specific to the applicant and relevant to the course (s) applied for that you think universities/colleges should be aware of.

Interviews

- Students will be called to interview for certain subjects.
- The subject that the student wishes to study will determine the type of interview. E.g. many applicants for Medicine have MMIs (Multiple Mini Interviews)
- Some universities will ask students to attend more than one interview.
- They generally happen in December for Oxford and Cambridge and in a wider time frame for Medicine, Dentistry and Veterinary Medicine.
- Universities use them to help to select between excellent candidates.

Pre-Admission Assessments

- Are going to become more popular.
- The UCAT is changing for the 2026 cohort.
- Entrance Tests currently used are:
 - ESAT
 - LNAT
 - TMUA
 - UCAT
- UCL has introduced a new admissions test called the TARA. It will be used for some subjects with Maths and Social Sciences in.

- Other tests are dependent on the university. Oxford and Cambridge have many different assessments both pre and at interview.
- It is the student's responsibility to book and manage their own tests.
- If a student is in receipt of the Sixth Form Bursary, Free School Meals or have exam adjustments, it is important that they read the website carefully and register to ensure that their needs are met.

Once students have heard from their universities...

- Students will hopefully have offers and they need to decide where they want to go.
- Students should select:
 - A firm choice- this should be the university that they most want to attend.
 - An Insurance choice- this is in case they miss their offer on results day.
- The insurance should have lower entry requirements than their firm choice e.g.
 - Firm: AAA
 - Insurance: ABB
- If for any reason students don't have an offer they can use 'Extra' on the UCAS system to apply for other courses.

What support is available at CCHS?

Tutor and Subject Teacher Support

Tutor support

- Tutors are experienced in the UCAS process.
- Tutors have regular 1-2-1 discussions with their tutees.
- Support with writing personal statements.
- Support with the applications.

Subject support:

- Mr. Carter and other staff run sessions on applying to Oxford and Cambridge.
- All departments offer personal statement support.
- Subject specialists support in the mock interview process.
- Subject staff prepare students for pre-admission assessments.

Wider support

- Students can use two weekdays in the Summer Term to visit
- A Higher Education focused Enrichment Day in July
 - Former students speak about their experiences, career and subject choices, and how to enter certain professions.
 - University Speaker to give students insight into the application and life at university.
- Dedicated time to UCAS/Careers in RTP sessions throughout June and July.
- UCAT Day training run by The Medic Portal.
- Dedicated higher education Team.
- Individual referee.
- Individual support from Dr Hiner and Mrs. Hopkins.
- Practice interviews:
 - Parent interviews.
 - Subject specialist interviews.



Architects design new buildings and the spaces around them, and work on the restoration and conservation of existing buildings.




Searching for courses





2 nd October 2025	Application deadline for conservatoire music applications. Dance/drama/theatre may have other deadlines. Students should check these carefully.
15 th October 2025	UCAS Deadline for applications to Oxbridge and MVD.
24 th November 2025	Internal CCHS deadline for all equal consideration applications.
14 th January 2026	UCAS Equal Consideration Deadline.
January 2026	University of Cambridge and University of Oxford decisions sent to applicants.
26 th February 2026	Extra Opens. This is the system that allows students holding no offers to add extra choices to their applications.
5 th July 2026	Clearing Opens
